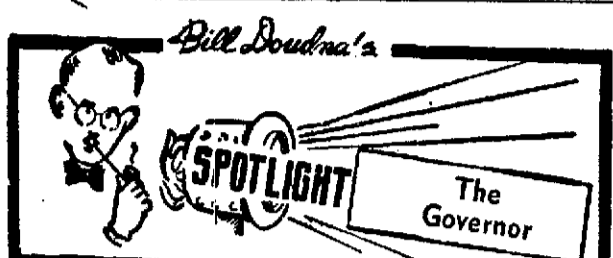


New Quartet to Be on WIBU

GOV. WALTER J. KOHLER will initiate a series of radio reports to the people of Wisconsin at 1:45 p. m. Sunday. He will speak over WHA and the state radio council network.

Gov. Kohler has endorsed a series of dramatic programs to be presented by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars on the same stations at 9 a. m. Saturdays, beginning this week.

The program is "The American Trail," 13 chapters of little-known American history. The first episode will deal with the establishment of the U. S. Constitution. Others will be about the Northwest ordinance, the Louisiana purchase, the Lewis and Clark expedition, and the California gold rush.

In a letter to Mrs. George L. Holm, national president of the auxiliary, Gov. Kohler said: "The American Trail" . . . is certain to make a great and good impression upon the youth of America. I wholeheartedly commend the Auxiliary . . . for it."

STORY: Dodo, one-time Ziegfeld star, is down on his luck, brought on mostly by his love for liquor and crap shooting. . . His wife, Paula, has left him and his son, Dink, is his only grip on reality and hope. . . He ruffs each effort for a comeback until TV takes a chance on him. . . Paula, meanwhile, wants to take the boy into her new home. . . And just as Dodo becomes a hit on TV—well,

80 per cent of you will guess the ending.
HIGH POINTS: Skelton does a great job of showing the fine line between humor and tragedy; what's funny to an audience is pathetic to his son. . . Tom Conside, the youngster, holds up well in a difficult role although he's unbelievably clairvoyant. . . The ballet scene is Skelton at his funniest, the parting with his boy is Skelton at his most dramatic (and he can act).
LOW POINTS: A shopworn theme dating back to Lon Chaney in "Laugh, Clown, Laugh" and Wallace Beery in "The Champ" . . . The ending is all too obvious.
VERDICT: A dandy, but not up to the elaborate advance build-up.
ALSO: "The Hoaxsters," a well edited anti-Communist document.

Jewish Vets Denounce Fight for Rosenbergs

OMAHA (J.P.)—The Jewish War Veterans of the United States have denounced groups fighting for convicted atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, National Commander Jesse Moss of the group said here Thursday.
Moss was here for a meeting of the Omaha JWV post 260. Moss said groups that immediately stressed the fact that the condemned Rosenbergs are "of Jewish extraction," and other groups which hurriedly attempted to rally Jewish persons behind the Rosenbergs were "equally bad."

Moss said the JWV headquarters has sent a message by Radio Free Europe to Jews in Russia and its satellites, telling them to withhold any moral support or approval of Communists.

"We know they are in no position to revolt," he said. He said the recent Russian purge of Jews both at home and in satellite nations "shocked us but didn't surprise us. It was inevitable because all tyranny follows the same road."
