

In this, of course, he was helped by the musicianship of Mr. and Mrs. Friedlander.

Unfortunately, the sonata's finale was something of a let-down, for it had an air of the theatrical-a departure from the strength and sincerity of the first two.

Earlier, the Friedlanders had played a melody-filled Schubert sonata (written originally for the arpeggione, a now defunct cellolike instrument), in which Mrs. Friedlander gave us something which has become rare-a truly lyric piano. The cellist, too, conveyed this

Friedlander also played two works for cello alone. The first was Bach's "Suite in C Minor," of dances stately and lively, in which one often could hear more voices than really were there. The second was a suite by Ernst Krenek, which served mainly to show off the cello's and the player's versatility. This, too, was a first Madison performance; a second might show more music in the piece.




