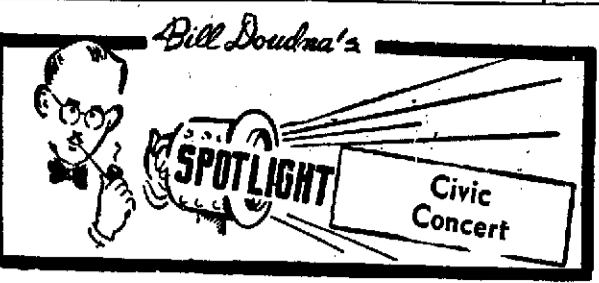

TIP O' THE MORNING: A new program, "The Week in Wisconsin," will start Sunday at 8:30 p.m. WKOW. It will consist of tape-recordings of highlights of the state's news events, with Ray Straeter as editor and narrator.

VERA WEIKEL ADAMS, a newcomer to Madison, sang her way to the hearts of her fellow townsmen Wednesday night and made them hope her residence is permanent.

As soloist with the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra, she showed her audience a flexible voice with qualities of both a lyric and a coloratura soprano, plus the kind of musicianship that could handle a Weber aria, a contemporary descriptive, work and Mozart's "Alleluia," which she sang as an encore.

Meanwhile, the orchestra under Walter Hoermann's unflinching direction not only gave her superior support but also played Cesar Franck's D-minor symphony and George Chadwick's "Jubilee" to win applause for itself.

In the symphony, the orchestra rose to heights of triumphant tone, especially in the second part of the first movement, and played the finale, with its touches of syncopation, in the properly happy spirit. In between was the lovely and popular allegretto, with Gerald Borsuk playing the English horn solo.

With her knack of acting added to her other attributes, Mrs. Adams made a fine thing of Samuel Barber's "Knoxville: Summer of 1915." The whole piece was good listening—much of it highly descriptive, some of it "mood music," some of it only suggestive of the lines it accompanied.

Based on a sort of prose poem, "Knoxville" needs a full conception of the text by its listeners; hence, despite Mrs. Adams' diction and the orchestra's apt description, it was a good thing the words were in the printed program.

"Jubilee," too, was partially descriptive music. Its middle theme sounded familiar. Either a popular song has been based on it, or this 1907 composition contained the epitome of all "pop" ballads.

Mrs. Adams' aria was "Leise, Leise" from "Der Freischutz," another example of her dramatic ability.

ON THE AIR: One of the most talented child actors I've

ever seen or heard will be in the cast of tonight's "Father Knows Best" episode (WMAQ at 7:30).

He is Ronald Keith, who is 6 years old and who can play a 6-year-old with complete credibility and composure. Not only that—he doesn't have to learn his lines by rote; he reads them.

The episode was recorded in Chicago while Robert Young (Father) was starring there in "The Country Girl," and while I was visiting the NBC studios.

Ronald was brought in from the suburbs, where he was playing in "Life with Mother," to portray a little demon for whom Father has to baby-sit.

His delivery of one line—"I'm a little stinker"—was one of the funniest things I've seen.

After the performance, the director did something practically unique in radio and the theater—he suggested to Ronald's mother that she take him to Hollywood, where child actors are a dime a dozen. Usually, you know, they're warned to stay away from the film capital.
