



Bill Doudna's TIP O' THE MORNING: Hollywood's biggest night—'Oscar' night—will be broadcast by WIBA. The time is 9:30 p. m. Thursday, March 19.

GUNNAR JOHANSEN'S virtuosity and the skill of the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra were combined Sunday afternoon, under the brilliant conducting of Antal Dorati, to sum up the music of Maurice Ravel. The composer had told a friend that in this piano concerto (in G major) he had expressed himself most completely.

And so it would seem, for in place of the shimmering 'Jeux d'Eau', as contemplative as 'Le Tombeau de Couperin,' and as vital as 'La Valse.' And it was full of the unexpected—in its rhythms, in its melodies, in its harmonies, in its shadings.

Johansen played with the first movement and the spirited finale, with its moments of jazz, with his customary fidelity and ease. The graceful second movement, however, was the most revealing of his and Dorati's musical integrity, both in the quiet opening cantilena and the decorations with which the piano developed it, while the orchestra was taking over the theme with a touch of mysticism.

In the concerto and elsewhere in the concert were bits of solo work among orchestra members which are remembered as brilliant performances of difficult passages—by the concertmaster, oboe, and clarinet in the second movement of Brahms's first symphony, by harp and bassoon in the concerto.

The familiar Brahms work with its triumphant finale, is believed by many listeners to be the greatest of symphonies. Whether this is true or not, it would be hard to find music so well worth repeated hearing as the lovely andante sostenuto and the triumphant fourth movement, with their memorable melodies.

To it, Dorati and his orchestra gave a thrilling performance, as they did to their encore, the 'Egmont' overture. The program opened with Mozart's 'Eine Kleine Nachtmusik,' for strings alone. Here Dorati's ability to bring out the full volume of the violins was almost overpowering; perhaps he did this to afford contrast with the quiet sections, but whether it was worth it is questionable.

At any rate, Johansen, Dorati, and the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra retained their places among Madison's favorite musicians—and probably climbed a rung or two.

ON THE AIR: A new series of organ recitals from some of Britain's great cathedrals and abbeys, given by their own organists, will begin on WHA and the state FM network Friday at 7:15 p. m. Program Director William Harley has announced.

The first 15-minute program will present music from St. Paul's cathedral. Other programs will be from Hereford cathedral, Gloucester, Winchester, Salisbury, Durham, York Minster, St. Giles' cathedral in Edinburgh, Chester cathedral, and Worcester cathedral.

The tape-recorded organ series is an inter-cultural exchange program from the British Broadcasting Corp. Operatic arias from all over the world are being featured on the state stations. 'From the Opera' series prepared by Jim Collins of the WHA music staff and presented each Sunday at 5:30 p. m.

Famous artists make their appearance in operas from Covent Garden, London; La Scala, in Italy; Vienna State Opera house; the German Opera house; and from American opera companies.

Debate Gets Too Hot—Council Votes by Bullet RECIPE. Brazil (UP)—One councilman was killed and another injured Saturday when a heated debate in the town council of Brejo de Madre de Deus erupted into a shooting match.

Eight of the nine councilmen present drew their guns and started shooting in a dispute about the closing of small livestock bridge within the town limits.

Abel Rodrigues, the only councilor who did not draw a gun, was shot and killed by Salustiano Carlas, another councilman. A third, Abilio Telmo, was wounded, but no one was sure who shot him.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By Oswald Jacoby South's first rebid in today's hand is only two hearts since he has only 14 points in high cards and a very poor fit with his partner's diamonds.

When North then tries again with a bid of three clubs, South can afford to bid game. North's bidding shows more than 10 points, and there is likely to be a fine play for game.

When West opens the queen of spades, South must resist the temptation to cover with dummy's king. There is no reason to suppose that West has led from a suit headed by the ace and queen. East must have the ace of spades, and it can therefore do no good to play dummy's king.

When West is allowed to hold the first trick with his queen of spades, he can do nothing to defeat the contract. He continues with spades, and East takes the ace. East returns a low trump, and South must hop right up with the ace.

Declarer next cashes the ace of diamonds, enters dummy with the ace of clubs, and carefully discards his last spade on the king of diamonds. At this point South can afford to give up a trump trick to West's king. South can regain the lead no matter what West returns, and it is then just a matter of drawing trumps and claiming the rest of the tricks.

South would lose his contract if he played the king of spades on the dummy at the first trick. East would win the first trick with the ace of spades and return the suit.
