First Baptist Senior choir: "Thy Word Is a Light," Morgan; "Sanctus," Gounod (Soprano solo by Vera Weikel Adams). Hymn: "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded," Hassler. Festival chorus: "Come, Thou Almighty King," Giardini; "Praise We Sing to Thee," Haydn-Luxsag; "All in the April Evening," Robertson; "How Lovely Is Thy Dwelling Place," Brahms. Benediction. Mrs. Paxton: "Allegro Maestoso e Vivace" from "Sonata in C Minor," Mendelssohn.

Other churches participating in the festival will be those from the First Christian, First Congregational, Lake Edge Congregational, Plymouth Congregational, Springfield Congregational, Grace Episcopal, Memorial Evangelical and Reformed, Evangelical United Brethren, Bethel Lutheran, Central Lutheran, Deerfield Lutheran, Lake View Lutheran, St. John's Lutheran, St. Mark's Lutheran, Bethany Methodist, South Shore Methodist, Trousdale Methodist, Greenwood, Moravian, and Christ Presbyterian churches. J. Russell Paxton will conduct the festival chorus. The festival offering will be used to buy music for the Louise Fuchs Memorial library.

ART IN CHICAGO: Exhibitions of works by Aaron Bohrod, artist in residence at the University of Wisconsin, and John Wilde, professor of art education at the university, will be held soon in Chicago. Bohrod's first Chicago exhibition in seven years will open Tuesday at the Stevens-Gross galleries, 620 N. Michigan ave. It will consist of recent paintings in oils and mixed media and a few new ceramic pieces. The show will close April 3. Hours will be 11 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. week days. Paintings and drawings by Wilde will be shown from Saturday through March 20 at the Newman Brown gallery, 15 E. Grand ave. A reception will be held at 7 p. m. Saturday. Gallery hours are 3 to 9 p. m. Monday through Friday and 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. Saturday.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The Wisconsin Restaurant Association made up an unusual request Wednesday. The association asked the Legislature to raise state restaurant licenses from \$3 to \$10 per year. The group's annual convention here approved a resolution requesting the raise in fees. The restaurant owners want this fee increased so that proper inspection of restaurants will be assured. State restaurant inspectors are paid from the fees and the resolution said the number of inspectors might be decreased if the fees are not raised.
