



TIP OF THE MORNING: A revival of the minstrel-show business which began slowly last summer is growing rapidly, and several tent-show minstrels are expected to tour in 1933.

TWO PLAYS presumed to have messages were presented Tuesday night at the Wisconsin Union theater, but the messages got buried in one case by a plethora of talk and in the other by a surplus of stagercraft.

The plays were Jean Paul Sartre's "No Exit" and Archibald MacLeish's "Fall of the City," produced by Wisconsin Players, with Orchestras — the University of Wisconsin dance society — collaborating on the MacLeish work.

Both, as it happens, are more understandable when read from a book than when heard and seen on a stage, although a Play Circle production of "No Exit" a few years ago was a satisfying theatrical experience, perhaps because of the smaller theater's intimacy and that production's faster pace.

The Sartre drama of life after death (in Hell, in this instance) had the advantage of Margaret Urban's perceptive acting as love, the urban, blunt, and sensible woman who found herself copped up for eternity with a nervous phlegm, supercharged with emotion, and a scatterbrained, self-centered girl, superficial in her approach to death as she had been in her living.

Ronald Ranscht played the man with a suitable intensity, and Sally Ann Sullivan was the lovely girl, Thomas Godfrey was seen briefly as a valet.

The play was a wearing one to watch. What it needed was a faster timing to take attention from its inactivity, Miss Sullivan's major scene — a last look on Earth — needed, too, some of the Ranscht tension.

As for "Fall of the City," the staging was remarkably detailed, with its fascinating chorus movement, especially in a realistic picture of panic; its simple setting; its effective lighting, and its highly illustrative music.

But the poet's warning of the danger that accompanies the loss of liberty was obscured by these very things and by the self-conscious reading of his lines, except in the case of Tom Detienne, the unseen announcer, and Don Robinson, as an orator.

The plays will be repeated at 8 each night through Saturday.

DISC OF THE DAY: For those who complain that contemporary American composers aren't writing good tunes, Columbia offers Virgil Thomson's "Cello Concerto," played by Luigi Silva and the Werner Janssen Symphony. It's both good listening and good performing. The second side has Thomson's "The Mother of Us All" suite.

ON THE AIR: Comments recorded in Madison will be heard on the first program of a series, "The People Talk Back," which will start Saturday on WHA and the state network. It will be heard at 2 p. m. each Saturday thereafter.

This series is the fourth produced by the National Assn. of Educational Broadcasters (NAEB) in cooperation with the Fund for Adult Education established by the Ford Foundation.

Program Director William Harley of WHA described the series as "an experiment supporting the democratic idea that every man is free to match his ideas openly with those of the expert or the public official."

Each program consists of an expert's statement on a controversial issue, followed by the reactions of people from all walks of life in all parts of the U. S. and then the expert's reply to their questions and comments.

Ideas of men and women in offices, factories, and homes were collected by NAEB producers

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Trouble in the sky

This is a tornado, like the one that struck the little town of Bald Knob, Arkansas, shortly before 5:30 p. m., on March 21, 1932. With a roar like that of an express train, the twister swept through the town.

Toll: 90 homes destroyed, 156 badly damaged out of a total of 542 in the Bald Knob community; 8 people killed, more than 126 injured. In less than an hour, the Red Cross was on the job. In 10 days, it served 9800 meals, supplied 20 pints of blood, furnished shelter and clothing for those who needed it. Said
