University Choir

TIP OF THE MORNING: Agnes Moorehead will star in an adaptation of Dickens' "The Signal Man" on "Suspense" over CBS Monday, March 23. Emyln Williams did his version on his recent appearance at the Wisconsin Union theater.

A CONCERT GRACED with beauty and spiced with humor was given by the University of Wisconsin A Cappella choir Sunday in Music Hall.

Under the direction of J. Russell Paxton, the organization showed considerable versatility and a fondness for contemporary music during a program which included Bach and Borodin as well as Britten and Willan.

The concert reached its peak just before intermission, with Willan's "The Three Kings" and two carols by Bethuel Gross.

There were two points of similarity between these songs and Rachmaninoff's "The Veneration of the Cross," which preceded them. First was the chorists' appreciation of the importance of dynamics to their delivery; second was the ability of individual sections to sustain tones while others wrapped melody around them.

Emphasized in Rachmaninoff these characteristics held over to Willan and Gross, with an added feature—the handling of unusual harmonies with admirable quality and precision.

Other particularly good performances were in the quiet staccatos of "Hasten Swiftly, Hasten Swiftly," a Slovakian carol; the brief swells of tone, suddenly cut off, in "O Dear! What Can the Matter Be?" and the beauty of the opening chorus of "Cavalleria Rusticana."

Helen Starr's solo in a chorus from "Prince Igor" and Ann Calhoun's accompaniment in the Mascagni number also rated mention.

WINNER AGAIN: "High Noon," a nominee for an "Oscar," was chosen by American critics, reviewers, and commentators as the best movie of 1952 in the Film Daily's 30th annual "10 best pictures poll," that newspaper will announce today.

Earlier, the Gary Cooper picture had won the New York Film Critics' award and the Associated Press poll.

Exactly 262 of the 334 writers and broadcasters polled by Film Daily voted for "High Noon" to "The Quiet Man," took second place with 215 votes. "The Greatest Show on Earth" placed third with 203, followed closely by "The African Queen" with 201.

The other pictures in the top 10—in this order—were "Ivanhoe," 155 votes; "Come Back, Little Sheba," 119 votes; "The Lavender Hill Mob," 98 votes; "Singing in the Rain," 88 votes; "With a Song in My Heart," 81 votes; and "Five Fingers," 70 votes.

Tied for 11th position—just outside the list of favorites—were "David and Bathsheba," "Stars and Stripes Forever," and "The River."

A total of 106 pictures received votes.
