

University Orchestra

TIP O' THE MORNING: The sound of the atomic blast in Nevada on Tuesday will be heard in a special broadcast on WIBA at 7:15 p. m.

AN INSPIRED PERFORMANCE of Richard Strauss' "Death and Transfiguration" climaxed a concert by the University of Wisconsin Symphony orchestra in the Wisconsin Union theater Sunday. Under the leadership of Prof. Richard C. Chase, the young musicians gave their all—and what they produced was an almost phenomenal playing of the complex tone poem.

"Death and Transfiguration" is the story of a man's fight for life and the realization, in death, of his life's ambitions. Whether the music told of stark terror or sublime joy, or quiet slumber or lively reminiscence, Chase and his orchestra played with capability and maturity belying the musicians' individual youth.

Brief solos dotted the work; a lucid one by Concertmaster Edmund Jacobs was especially good. Harriet Chase, university senior, was the afternoon's soloist, playing Schumann's only piano concerto.

The diminutive pianist was there to make music rather than to display her technical accomplishment. And that, of course, is just what this concerto asks of the musician, for it is filled with melody, enough tunes for an opera, and the conversations between piano and orchestra are restatements and embellishments of the solo instrument's many songs.

The singing tone which Miss Chase produced carried over into the cadenza, which was about the only showy part of the work and which she played with great skill.

In short, this was one of the best performances by a student soloist in the orchestra's history.

The program had drama, too, in the exciting playing of Glinka's turbulent overture to "Russian and Ludmila," with the violins handling the frantic opening bars almost perfectly. Such unanimity would have been good to hear in the Bach "Suite in D Major" which opened the concert.

TOUR: The University of Wisconsin Pro Arte quartet—temporarily still a trio because of one member's illness—will start its annual state tour Thursday, Apr. 9.

The first concert will be at the Manitowoc university extension center.

Because Second Violinist Albert Rahier is still convalescing from an illness, Rudolf Kolisch, first violinist, Erast Friedlander, cellist, and Bernard Mlotzky, violist, will play string trios on all programs.

Prof. Leo Steffens of the school of music will join the group at several points on the tour.

Mary college; Apr. 22, Milwaukee, Cardinal Stritch college; and Apr. 23, Milwaukee, Wisconsin State college.

BAND: Two Madison and one area student at the University of Wisconsin will be featured soloists at the University Band's 67th annual Palm Sunday concert in the Wisconsin Union Theater at 3 p. m. Mar. 29.

Soloists will be Julie and Juliette Gerke, 3736 Nakoma rd., pianists, and John Haswell, DeForest, and Barbara Moorehead, Kenilworth, III, vocalists.

The concert will feature music from Verdi's "Requiem" and two new compositions by Wisconsin composers—Cleve Akey, Wisconsin Rapids, and Harold Ruseh, Shawano.

Tickets for the concert will go on sale Monday.

Bergman Wants Stage Career, No More Films

NAPLES, Italy (AP)—Actress Ingrid Bergman announced Sunday she is "through with films" and wants to go on the stage, but only if her husband is there.

The glamorous Swedish star said she would retire from films after completing her present movie, "New Wine," being made in the Naples vicinity under direction of her husband, Roberto Rossellini.

"I am tired of movies and I intend to give them up and go on the stage as soon as we have finished this picture," she said.

"The only problem is that I would be willing to do a stage role only if I could be near my husband—I would not work anywhere if he were not there."

She said she would appear "some time in May" on the stage, in Swiss composer Arthur Honegger's modern opera "Joan of Arc at the Stake" in Milan.
