FOR the first time in "Oscar" history, ceremonies will be broadcast tonight from New York City as well as from Hollywood.

The principal presentation ceremonies will be in the RKO Patheaus theater in Hollywood, where Bob Hope will be master of ceremonies. Academy Award nominees and past winners who are in the East will congregate at New York's International theater. There, Conrad Nagel will be master of ceremonies and Fredric March will present "Oscars."

History, ceremonies will be broadcast tonight from New York City as well as from Hollywood. The principal presentation ceremonies will be in the RKO Patheaus theater in Hollywood, where Bob Hope will be master of ceremonies. Academy Award nominees and past winners who are in the East will congregate at New York's International theater. March, a University of Wisconsin alumnus, has won two Awards as best actor—for "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" in 1932 and for "The Best Years of Our Lives" in 1946. Nagel is a former president of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

The 90-minute program will be broadcast by WIBA beginning at 9:30. Paul Douglas will be commentator for the Hollywood proceedings and Nagel will handle the New York portion of the program.

Incidentally, most of the "Oscar" nominees are familiar to NBC-WIBA listeners. Shirley Booth was formerly Miss Duffie on "Duffy's Tavern," started in "Strictly Business," a comedy series, in 1940, and has been guest star on "Theater Guild," the Fred Allen show, and other series.

Bette Davis, Joan Crawford, Susan Hayward, Gary Cooper, Kirk Douglas, and Jose Ferrer have been frequent guest performers on dramatic and variety shows. Miss Hayward was one of seven Hollywood newcomers who appeared in 1947 on a program called "Hollywood Star Preview."

BOOK ON SOWERBY: Ruth Pflieger Andrews, Madison organist, is writing a book on composer Leo Sowerby, whose cantata with organ and piano, "Forsaken of Man," will be sung by the University chorus Sunday at 4:15 p. m. in the Wisconsin Union theater.

J. Russell Paxton is directing the chorus, and Allan Keller, tenor, and Charles Greene, baritone, soloists from Chicago, will sing the roles of the Evangelist and of Jesus.

Sowerby has written symphonies, choral works with orchestra and organ both, chamber music, and for solo piano and organ. He is head of the department of composition at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago, and recently received a citation from the American Guild of Organists, according to Mrs. Andrews.

FOR GODFREY: While Arthur Godfrey is off the air to undergo surgery, Robert Q. Lewis will handle his morning shows and Carry Moore will take over the "Talent Scouts" program.

IN SPANISH: "Carmen de la Tana," Spanish-language film based on Melville's story, will be shown at 7:30 tonight in 116 Education bldg. The picture, which has English subtitles, stars Imperio Argentina as Carmen and Manuel Luna as Don Jose.

AT COLUMBUS: The a cappella choir and concert band of the Northwestern Schools, Minneapolis, will give a concert Saturday night, April 4, in the high school at Columbus. This is the seventh annual tour of the two organizations, which have a total membership of 68.
