



TIP OF THE MORNING: Bill Cullen will succeed John Henry Faulk on "Walk a Mile" (NBC-WJBA) as of April 8.

PABLO CASALS, world-famous cellist, will not play this summer except in the vicinity of his home in Prades, he says in a letter to be published in the March 28 issue of the Saturday Review.

A French newspaper had reported impending concerts by Casals this year in Switzerland and Belgium. Irving Kolodin, music editor of the Saturday Review, asked Casals about this radical change in his "spiritual boycott" in protest against recognition of Franco Spain by the democracies.

Kolodin also asked him to define the motives which have kept him from playing in public except in the Prades area. Here is Casals' answer:

"Permit me, first, to state that I am not going to conduct or play in public concerts in Switzerland, Belgium, or any place else this summer outside of our annual festival in Rousillon where I live.

"My difficult and painful decision of voluntary exile in Prades came from the depths of my heart and conscience. I could not reconcile my feeling of grief for my native Spain with the natural desire to perform in countries like America, which I have known and loved since 1900, but whose governments have chosen to ignore my own country's plight.

"To refuse to perform in a Soviet Russia or a Nazi Germany, as I have done since the inception of such contemporary regimes, seems only natural for a man of democratic principles. To have to refuse invitations from the democratic countries because of their governments' apparent lack of these same principles is indeed ironic and personally tragic for me. It is, however, the only attitude I can take that is consistent with my feelings. These feelings have not at any time changed since 1945.

"My friend Albert Schweitzer, in discussing my attitude, once told me that, in his opinion it is more important to create than to protest. I replied, 'Why not both?'

"The great artists and people who, since 1950, have honored me by their creation and participation in our festivals have given me the joy to be able once again to make music without compromising my convictions.

"Until such a time as the democracies find it possible to reject all dictatorships instead of only those imminently threatening them, or until my conscience permits me to create without protesting, my present home shall remain the unique place of my activities."

BAND CONCERT: The Badger School band will give its first concert at 8 p. m. Friday at the school auditorium. Elmer Ziegler is bandmaster.

Most of the band members will play solos—Karen Huessig, Marcia Guetschow, JaNelle Koffmeyer, and Barbara Arnett, clarinets; James Green, alto; Eddie Neesvig, James Woollever, and Gary Woollever, cornets; William Frederick and James Copus, tubas; Lois Bjornstad, flute; Jerry Raether, trombone; Maxine Nelson, baritone, and Judy Penn and June Ostrum, drums.

DISC OF THE DAY: Two seldom-heard, and rather light works are offered by Sir Thomas Beecham on a Columbia LP—"Triumph of Neptune," by Berners, and "Punch and the Child," by Arnell. The former is played by the Philadelphia orchestra, the latter by the Royal Philharmonic. In both the playing is brilliant, but it seems wasted on the Berners work, except for a section called "The Frozen Forest." Recording on the Arnell piece is far superior.

FRENCH PLAY: An old-fashioned comedy, complete with double-take and chase, will be presented by the University of Wisconsin department of French and Italian at 8 p. m., Monday, April 6, in the Wisconsin Union theater.

"Le Chapeau de paille d'Italie" (The Italian Straw Hat) involves a case of horse-meets-hat to compound the usual boy-meets-girl theme. It has been described as a "vaudeville," or lighter-than-farce, play in which action rather than dialogue produces the comedy.

A perennial favorite with amateur theatrical groups, the comedy was recently edited as a reading text by Profs. Karl Botke and Alexander Kroff. Kroff will direct the campus production.

Tickets are on sale at the theater boxoffice.
