

**SPOTLIGHT** Gunnar Johansen

**TIP O' THE MORNING:** A painting by Raoul Dufy, the French artist who died earlier this week, is in the Abbott Laboratories collection now on display at Scanlan hall.

WHEN Gunnar Johansen was new to Madison, we reviewers used all the superlatives we could muster to describe his playing. At Music hall Wednesday night, he was still worth them, and more.

With authority and without theatricals, the pianist gave a program gratifying in every particular.

He played Bach (with an assist from Busoni), Mozart, Mendelssohn, Chopin, and Liszt, catching in each work the spirit of the composer just as much as he did in a toccata by Johansen himself.

A fine technician, Johansen placed with sure integrity that the technical considerations became secondary to the listener. Just as he can make the big piano in the Wisconsin Union theater speak with sweetness and delicacy, so he made the little one in Music hall resound with power.

His Bach chorale prelude had dignity and great beauty; the "Chaconne" was thoughtful and played with care. His Mozart sonata was gay and playful in the first movement, lyric, graceful, and contemplative in the second, and dancing in the third.

Mendelssohn's "Songs Without Words" (including the popular "Spring Song") were varied in texture, and his Liszt "Legends" were vivid tone pictures of "St. Francis Sermon to the Birds" and "St. Francis Walking on the Waves" and "The Turbulent Ones," too.

From Chopin came the "Scherzo in B Minor," with its dreamy middle section framed with fireworks, and the lovely "Impromptu in F Sharp." Johansen played his own "Toccata in the Phrygian Mode," sometimes stark and sometimes brilliant with color, between Chopin and Liszt, earning applause both as composer and as performer.

**ON THE AIR:** For the first time in the memory of radio folk here, a broadcast will come from Menota State hospital. A portion of tonight's variety show, sponsored by the Zonta club, will be recorded for airing at 7 p. m. Friday by WIBA and WIBA-FM.

Except for two men, all the participants will be Menota patients. The exceptions are Edward B. Karpowicz, director of recreation, and John B. Birchall, recreational therapist. The latter will be master of ceremonies. Names of performers will not be announced.

**CONCERTS:** A group of University of Wisconsin students who will give a concert at 8:15 p. m. Monday in Music hall also will play at Madison high schools in May.

The woodwind ensembles are directed by William Druckenmiller, university graduate student, who teaches woodwinds on the campus. Born in Reading, Pa., he was a member of the Reading Symphony orchestra and the King-dome band, one of the country's oldest. He studied at the Juillard School of Music before joining the Maritime Service band and later, the U. S. navy. After World War II, he returned to Juillard to earn his bachelor degree.

Then he went to Columbia university to earn his master's degree, and there played solo flute in the University Chamber Symphony, and for the school's opera and ballet series. He also was flute soloist at the Bach festivals at Rollins college, Winter Park, Fla.

Before coming to Wisconsin, Druckenmiller taught at Drake university, played in the Des Moines Symphony orchestra, and for a year was director of instrumental music at Hope college, Holland, Mich.

He will be one of the soloists at the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra's May concert.

**NAMES IN THE NEWS:** A new quiz show, "The Phrase That Pays," with Red Benson as master of ceremonies, will replace Bob and Ray on NBC-WIBA Mondays through Fridays at 10:45 a. m., starting March 30.

Ralph Johnson, flutist and one of the founders of the Chicago Symphony Woodwind quintet, will be flute soloist when the Milton Choral Union presents the "St. Matthew Passion" in Janesville on April 12. Robert Mayer, oboist and another of the quintet's founders, will be in the orchestra.

Ray Bolger, dancing comedian, Madison, will participate in a performance of Bach's B-minor Mass radio and television contract with the American Broadcasting Co.

Wayne Morris, who left the Warner studios four years ago after a 15-year association, will return to play a top role in "Rid-ling Shotgun."

Whit Bissell, character actor who deserted Hollywood a year ago in favor of Eastern television, will return to films in "Arizona Out-post" at RKO Radio.



# JACOBY ON BRIDGE

"This is my favorite hand from the 1953 Life Masters Individual," my friend, Walt Cornors, of Media, Pa., told me the other day. "The bidding was sound and solid, and declarer made his best play at every moment. It was a pleasure to find the right defense against him. 'I held the West cards,' Walt told me, 'and opened the king of clubs. Declarer won in the dummy and had to decide whether to begin with the diamonds or with the trumps.'

He correctly decided that his best play to lose only one diamond trick was to play East for a doubleton ten and to lead a low diamond from the dummy at once.

"East, my partner, had to go up with the king of diamonds, since it would have done him no good to play low. This put South in position to lead the jack of diamonds through at his next opportunity, and thus limit the diamond loss to one trick.

"My partner returned the ten of clubs, and I overtook in order to cash the jack and queen. It now looked as though we were going to be held to two clubs, one diamond and one trump. Fortunately for our side, however, I happened to push out my last club.

"This gave my partner the chance to rise to the occasion by trumping with the seven of hearts. South was forced to overruff with the ten of hearts, and now I had two natural trump tricks!

That's why this is my favorite hand. It isn't often, even in a Life

Master event, that you get absolutely perfect bidding, with fine play on both sides of the table."

A very pretty hand, to be sure. Walt was too modest to emphasize his own role—but I hope everybody notices what a neat play it was to lead the last club. This was the star play of the hand—which may be another reason Walt remembers it with such affection.
