**Ballet Theater**

**TIP O' THE MORNING:** "Classical Hour" will move to 9 p. m. Saturdays on WKOW, effective this weekend. It has been a Sunday night feature.

**BALLET** in the great tradition, in the American idiom, and just for fun were given to a capacity audience Thursday night at the Parkway theater.

The company was Ballet Theater, headed by Igor Youskevitch, John Kriza, Alicia Alonso, and Mary Ellen Moylan.

Paula Lloyd came close to winning a place with the stars. Youskevitch and Miss Alonso, as fine a pair of dancers as there is in the country, climaxed the performance with the "Black Swan" pas de deux, danced exquisitely by Miss Alonso and virtuously by her partner. Here was the essence of classical ballet with pirouettes, entrechats (the step in which the dancer strikes heels together or crosses legs while in midair), and airy leaps.

Kriza's work was of truly star calibre in "Billy the Kid." Besides being a brilliant dancer, he showed himself a first-rate pantomimist and, in his first appearance as a lad at his mother's apron-strings, a clever comedian. The opening scene, with its cowboys, gossips, soldiers, and burlesque queens, was a vivid overture by the corps de ballet. In the opening "Constantia," the girls and boys showed themselves as a sprightly, well-trained group. But two of the soloists were disappointing. Heretofore lithe, agile, and a delight, Miss Moylan was icy in demeanor and less than fluent. Scott Douglas was detached and uncertain.

Miss Lloyd's vivacity and charm, paired with the dancing ability she showed again in the exuberant "Graduation Ball," saved "Constantia" from dullness. In the closing comedy, Douglas returned as her partner, and shared in her vitality.

In that ballet, Barbara Lloyd's natural clowning, Jenny Workman's ease, and Edward Caton's comedy were notable.

Costuming was excellent, but settings were definitely road-show rather than regal or spectacular.

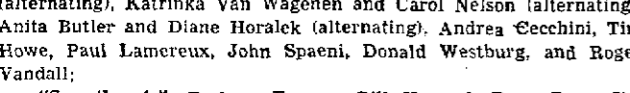

As in all musicals, all works out well for (1) the lovers (2) the parents and (3) the magazine.

**HIGH POINTS:** Some clever choreography, especially the football number and O'Connor's travelogue number in the Look studio . . . little Clarabelle brightened some otherwise dull spots . . . Debbie Reynolds rejuvenates tired eyes.

**LOW POINTS:** Without the versatile and talented O'Connor, the whole picture cloud have been a first-class flop.

**VERDICT:** Light and entertaining but no history-maker.
