FOND DU LAC — The navy has awarded a \$4,500,000 contract to the Giddings and Lewis Machine Tool Co. here. Ralph J. Kraut, president of the company, said Friday.

Kraut said the contract is the largest single order received directly from the Navy at Giddings and Lewis.

The contract calls for delivery of 22 heavy-duty machine tools to the Navy by the end of 1954.

Wisconsin Academy Will Meet on U.W. Campus Apr. 24-25

The Wisconsin Academy of Sciences, Arts, and Letters, one of the two broadest organizations of its kind in the nation, will meet for three sessions on the University of Wisconsin campus Apr. 24-25.

Dr. Robert J. Dicke, university entomologist and secretary-treasurer of the academy, issued the call to the annual sessions Friday.

Prof. Katherine G. Nelson, Milwaukee Downer, is academy president.

Prof. Dicke reported that the Junior Academy of Science competition winners would present their prize-winning papers at a session held in conjunction with the Wisconsin Academy meeting.

Papers in fields ranging from literature to science will be presented at the Wisconsin Academy sessions, so grouped that sciences, arts, and letters will be represented in all sessions.

Prof. Dicke said, "is a broadening influence in our world of specializations. It not only encourages 'amateur' participation in the sciences, arts, and letters, but gives us in specialized fields the opportunity to share in the developments in fields far from our own."

The 400 members include men and women who are teachers, doctors, lawyers, clergymen, business men, government employes, and specialists in other fields.

In addition to its annual meeting, it publishes in its "Transactions" the papers presented by its members and maintains, at the State Historical Library in Madison, a library of 35,300 volumes of journals from other societies.

The Junior Academy of Science, which it sponsors, is comprised of 3,188 students in 111 science clubs in Wisconsin high schools.

All members of the Wisconsin Academy and the Junior Academy annual meeting this year will be held in Babcock Hall.

FFA to Compete Here in Judging

Hundreds of Future Farmers of America (FFA) members will be in Madison Apr. 17 to compete in the annual state judging contest on the University of Wisconsin campus.

The pupils of vocational agriculture will test their ability in judging dairy cattle, fat stock meats, dairy products, poultry and eggs, and farm crops.

J. Frank Wilkinson, contest manager, said that each judging team will consist of three members.

A year ago, 164 schools sent 367 teams and 1,101 members to compete for the trip honors that are awarded the winners.

The winning teams in judging dairy cattle, dairy products, and poultry and eggs will be awarded trips to the Waterloo Dairy Cattle Congress; top fat stock and meats teams will go to the Kansas City Royal; and Crops and Farm Management teams will go to the International Live Stock Exposition at Chicago.

Armed Forces Women to Get Beauty Course

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department announced Friday it has undertaken the task of teaching women in the armed forces how to look good in uniform.

The department did not say there have been complaints about the way the servicewomen look. But it did say there have been many requests "for guidance in making the most attractive appearance in uniform."

The spruce-up project is being directed by Albert H. Behrens, advertising manager for a cosmetics manufacturer, with the assistance of Capt. Evelyn J. Blewett of the Air Force.

More than 40,000 women in the Army, Navy, Marines, and Air Force will be given instruction in good grooming by instructors from the Toilet Goods Association.

They also will receive a "good grooming manual" and a chance to see a motion picture on the subject.

Capt. Blewett described the venture as a "non-commercial, non-profit cooperation" between the Defense Department and the Toilet Goods Association.

CIO Union Calls Strike at GE Electronics Plant

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP) — The CIO Electrical Workers' union Friday called an "immediate" strike by 10,000 workers at the electronics plant of the General Electric Co. here.

Union officials said the walk-out was ordered because the company was shipping television set parts from the plant in anticipation of a strike.

A company spokesman denied the accusation. The walkout was ordered as representatives of some 75,000 GE workers were meeting in New York City with company officials to negotiate new wage demands under a contract reopening clause.

The union officials had asked locals to take a strike vote to back up demands for a 18 cent hourly wage increase package.
