**Bill Doudna's Spotlight**

**A TIGHTLY-WRITTEN**  
A drama about a psychopathic killer, his tension eased by flashes of humor, opened Thursday night at West high school. The Madison Theater Guild will repeat the play, "Twilight Walk," at 8 tonight in that auditorium and at 8 p.m. Saturday in East high school.

A. B. Shiffrin's drama shows an adult interest in and an intelligent understanding of dealing with the mentally ill. It is this approach to the story which saves it from being merely melodramatic.

Aside from the killer, whose identity is hinted to the audience early in the first act, the central figure is a girl writer, played by Carol Cowan, who believes that the man who has strangled four girls in Central park should be helped by psychiatry. Even when she realizes that she is talking with him alone, and then is saved from his hands only by the park's light switches, she holds to her belief.

Opposing her view is a hard-fisted, tough-talking detective who seeks the slayer only to destroy him.

Pat Herson and John Barsness gave the play's top performances, the former as the detective and the latter as a youth of 20, resentful of his mother's selfish and unremitting protection.

Both were highly realistic in their portrayals, giving the parts complete credibility.

Miss Cowan was good, too, after she began to get the feel of the part midway through the first act. One had the feeling at first that the girl was smug in her beliefs, but as the drama moved on Miss Cowan added sincerity to her work which left the smugness behind.

Eleanor Grant was the protective mother, lightening the characterization with bits of humor which, I suspect, the author never intended it to have but which made the role more real. Marvin Foster had little to do as the girl's fiancé, but did that little well.

Nineteen minor players brightened the play. Particularly good were Vergenne Foschage, as one of the murder victims; Rod MacDowell, as her boy friend; David Todd, a miniature reproduction of a punch-drunk fighter he was following; and Virginia Lee Ranch as a young mother spouting Brooklynes.

Al Barraclough, who directed the play, also designed the expressive and uncluttered setting.

**8 Governors of Theater Guild Resign**  
Resignations of eight members of the board of governors of the Madison Theater Guild came as a result of a "vote of non-confidence" from the membership and the Madison board of education, one of them said Thursday.

Frederick A. Buerki compared the situation with that of the French or British government when the legislative body refuses to support the cabinet.

Disagreement between the governors and the membership was the cause of the resignations, said Buerki.

The resignations followed. Besides Buerki, those who left were Mrs. Eleanor Grant, Mrs. Margot Herriott, Paul F. Hunter, Maxine B. Lighthall (who also resigned as treasurer), Walter E. Malec, McE Merriman, and Mrs. Mildred Wirtka.

"We feel," Buerki said, "that there was nothing for us to do but resign from the board, since the members had rejected our decision."

One of the objections of Barraclough, Buerki said, was his failure to recognize the importance of children's plays in the Guild program.

The three who did not resign were Mrs. Julia Mailer, president; Joe Klein, vice-president, and Richard Dillon, secretary.

The Guild will nominate members for the eight board positions at a meeting at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Community Center. Meanwhile, the remaining governors have appointed interim members to serve until after election day in May.
