**Romeo and Juliet Sidelights**

EVERY play of Shakespeare has sidelights, and these have proved a delight to many persons. Take, for instance, the lines about Queen Mab in the play entitled "Romeo and Juliet." Romeo mentions a dream to a friend, and the friend declares that dreams describe her as "no bigger than an agate-stone in a finger ring."

"Her chariot," he adds, "is an empty hazel-nut . . . in this state she gallops night by night through lovers' brains, and then they dream of love."

The poet also says that Queen Mab's chariot has a cover made of the wings of grasshoppers, and that her steeds are "little atomies" which she drives across "men's noses as they lie asleep."

Scene in Italy

In "Romeo and Juliet" we find a tragedy. It is a story of love, but in the end the love turns out sadly.

The scene of the play is Verona, a city in northern Italy. Two leading families are in the midst of a feud. They are the Capulets and the Montagues.

It so happens that Count Paris is seeking the hand of Juliet, the young daughter in the Capulet family. Her father tells the count that he can marry Juliet if he wins her heart.

Count Paris invites Count Paris to attend a grand party. The count hopes that during the feasting and dancing his suit will be accepted by the beautiful girl.

As things turn out, something very different happens. Juliet is charmed by a young man who comes to the party wearing a mask. Shortly after he leaves, she learns that the young man is Romeo, son of the Montague family!

Married in Secret

Despite that trouble, the flame of love burns strongly in both young hearts. Soon they pledge their troth and manage to be married in secret.

Juliet feels the anger of her father when she learns what has taken place. Hoping to gain time, she makes believe that she is falling in with plans to wed Count Paris.

Meanwhile Romeo becomes mixed up in a street fight between about 2900 B. C.

Many members of the Capulet and Montague clans. He tries to halt the trouble, but afterward is blamed, and is banished from Verona by order of the prince who rules the city.

With that as the base of the plot, the play works to its end, with the lovers moving to tragic depths. Juliet and Romeo have only the wish to live together in happy marriage, but both come to their death as the result of a series of mistakes.

Looking at their dead bodies, the heads of the houses of Montague and Capulet shake hands. At last they agree that the feud between their families is ended.

**City Man Selected to MC Old-Time Fiddlers' Contest**

A Madison fiddler will be master of ceremonies for the sixth annual Southern Wisconsin Old Time Fiddlers' contest which is to be held at the Community Center on Sunday, April 26.

Cliff Hutchinson, publicly director for the state department of agriculture, will introduce the contestants and act as master of ceremonies for both of the fiddling sections and extra features and novelty acts.

He is right at home when old time fiddling is featured.

His Irish father jugged and played the fiddle in the lumber camps in northern Wisconsin for many years and Hutchinson recalls the square dancing at his home, with rugs rolled up and two or three fiddlers inspiring the dancers.

Hutchinson has made a hobby of strined instruments and plays equally well on the fiddle, guitar, mandolin, mandola, viola, piano, and oboe. He played the organ in the theater in the 1930s and played the violin for several seasons with a WLS troupe.

Since coming to Madison in 1950, he has acted as song master, accompanist for community singing, and emcee for many public and private gatherings.

**Buying TV Presents Problems**

"Have you bought your television set?" the Old Master asked.

"Not yet," I said. "I'm still looking around."

"What do you have in mind?" he asked.

"Naturally," I said. "I want a good one, and one that will bring in the new WHF stations. By good, I mean a well-engineered receiver."

"But there are a good many other factors, too, which anyone who's in the market has to consider."

"For example?," said my friend.

"Cost, of course, is one of them, and a very important one. I think you just have to set a maximum for yourself, and work down from that. In other words, you have to figure how much you can afford to spend, and then study the characteristics of the sets in that price field."

"And in figuring cost, you mustn't forget the antenna; its location, which can affect the price, and possible repairs and upkeep."

"How are you going to figure repairs and upkeep?" he asked.

"I haven't the slightest notion," I said. "But I'm pretty sure that they wouldn't be high on a well-built set acquired from a responsible dealer who offers a sound contract."

"But these aren't the only considerations, are they?" my friend inquired.

"Far from it," I said. "The next important one is location. When and if we buy a receiver, we have to choose a place for it and then we have to find a set that will fit that place."

"What do you want—a table set or a console?,"

"It all depends on the situation," I said. "You know our home—what do you think?"

"Well," said the old Master, "in view of what you've been saying, I don't think what you want has much to do with it."

"The ideal setup, I suppose, is a built-in music area with television, radio, record-player, records, and even some reference books close at hand."

"And you know as well as I do that ideals are pretty expensive things to have."

"The second thing you talked about was cost, so unless you're a handy-Andy you may run into an expensive operation with a built-in job."

"What do you advise?" I asked.

"I'll go along with you on most of your ideas," the Old Master said, "but if you insist on keeping within your budget—and who shouldn't?—you'll have to revise some of them, since I know you aren't the king of cabinet-makers."

"I'd suggest thinking about it in this order: 'First, the amount you figure you can spend; 'Second, the best set you can find at that price; 'Third, the best location for that particular model, remembering that you have to consider sound as well as sight.'"

"Haven't we forgotten about the size of the screen?" I said.

"You may have, but I haven't," said the Old Master. "I didn't mention it, because it's a part of the price and the location problems."

"I think you'll just have to go around looking at the various sizes, and fit one into your general scheme."

"You aren't much help," I said, with just a trace of bitterness.

"Every man to his own taste," said the Old Master, "and don't forget that good taste is largely the result of good judgment."
