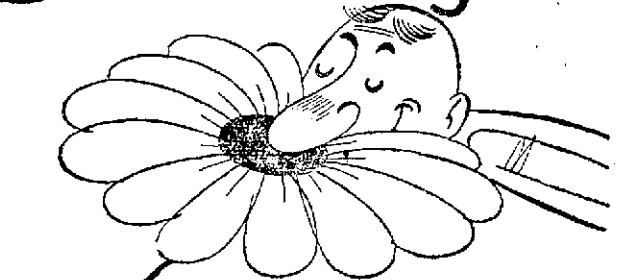


TIP OF THE MORNING: An "unusually reliable" Hollywood source tells us that all four networks are bidding briskly for Harry S. Truman's services as a commentator.

## 3-D Development May Give Better Films to Video

NEW YORK (U.P.)—The television industry soon may be able to show its viewers top-flight movies, which now are strictly forbidden to TV audiences, Spyros Skouras, president of 20th Century-Fox Films Corp., said that as the movie industry moves more and more into three-dimensional pictures, it will find it profitable to release its old two-dimensional films to television.

Until now, the movie industry generally has allowed only very old or second-rate pictures to be shown on television.

Skouras said 20th Century has a library of about 900 films and "up to this time, for our own sound business reasons, we have refrained from disposing of these pictures to television stations. Among the reasons have been that we are engaged primarily in the making and distribution of pictures for theater purposes and the re-issue from time to time of the older pictures."

However, he added, with the advent of three-dimensional films, "it is anticipated that the theater demand for motion pictures will be generally for pictures of the type which will become increasingly advantageous to make available some of the older pictures for television."

Unofficially, it was learned some top-flight pictures may be released to television in the fall. Executives of other major movie studios refused comment on Skouras' statement.

**3 Eligible for City Welfare Director**  
Three eligible candidates for the position of city welfare director, vacated by the death of John Putz, have been certified by the Personnel Board, Mayor George B. Konecny reported Tuesday, but he had not decided which one will be recommended.

The appointment is subject to confirmation by the City Council. The three eligibles are Robert G. Hintz, Delavan, child welfare worker in the Walworth county Public Welfare Department, Elma Christianson, Madison, acting welfare director, and Gabriel J. Popovich, Milwaukee, casework supervisor in the Milwaukee county Public Welfare Department.

Hintz is a University of Wisconsin graduate and Popovich a Marquette University alumnus. Both are World War II veterans and both received 5 points veterans' preference in their civil service ratings.

Miss Christianson was Putz's assistant and has been in charge of the office since his death.
