Two artists from Madison and one from Dodgeville were among the winners of prizes in the 25th annual Student Art show of the University of Wisconsin...

Awards were announced Wednesday night in Great Hall by Prof. Alexander Severino of the art education department.

Arleen Temperon, 36 Sherman terrace, won the Recent \$5 merchandise award for her pottery, "Black Stoneware Bowl."

Dick Thiel, 19 Roxbury rd., received the Rennebohm \$5 merchandise award for "Dendant No. 2," a silverwork entry.

James Rieff, Dodgeville, won the University Co-Op \$35 purchase prize for "Essence of War" in the mixed technique group in painting.

The judges grouped six small awards to give a \$50 prize to David Pease, Streator Ill., for an oil, "DeKoven Street."

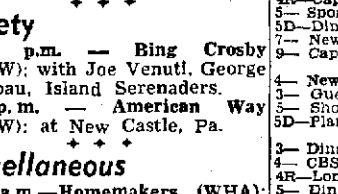
Missing for a Year, Yank Ace Promoted
