Emily Fromm, accompanist, will contribute a group of piano solos to the program. She is musical director and organist at Memorial Evangelical and Reformed church, and formerly was staff musician and organist at WTMJ, WISN, and WEMP, Milwaukee.

Hypnotic Cure Used

For a long time, people spoke of the treatments of Dr. Friedrich Mesmer as "Mesmerism." The doctor cured with the help of "animal magnetism."

Shortly before the Battle of Waterloo, and six months before his 82nd birthday, Dr. Mesmer died in Switzerland. It appears that he truly believed that his work had been helpful to the human race.

Other doctors took up the study of "Mesmerism," and used it on some of their patients. One of these was Dr. James Braid, a Scotsman who was practicing medicine in Manchester, England. He suggested that people speak of the art as "hypnotism" instead of "Mesmerism." The word "hypnotism" was made up of Greek terms, and means "putting to sleep."

Pain Protection

Before modern anesthetics came into use, many doctors (especially in France and Great Britain) hypnotized their patients before performing operations. This was successful in saving numerous persons from suffering pain.

During the present century, hypnotism has been employed in treating several maladies, including stammering.

One doctor reported that he cured 15 persons of stammering by hypnotizing them. These 15 were members of a group of 48. Among the others, stammering was reduced in 19 cases.

The treatments were given over and over again. One 17-year-old boy was hypnotized 72 times before he was reported "partly cured." Other methods of treating stammering are known, and

Maennerchor and Kirkpatrick

Several unusual things are going to happen Friday night at Turner hall.

Primarily the event will be the spring concert of the Madison Maennerchor. It will be, in fact, the first concert of the organization's second year. And the Maennerchor is Madison's oldest musical group.

Two "firsts" are on the schedule, unless somebody can come up with records to disprove them. For the first time, the guest soloist will be a bassoonist; for the first time, a dancer will take part in the program.

Don Kirkpatrick will be the soloist, performing on an instrument seldom heard in a solo role. The dancer will be Sylvia Hasler, who will appear in the finale—set around a gypsy campfire.

Don Kirkpatrick is a member of one of Madison's most musical families. His parents, his wife, and his four brothers are musicians. In fact, Don learned to play the bassoon so he could complete a family woodwind quartet.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. R. Bruce Kirkpatrick. His mother played the cello and saxophone; besides that, he is president of the Madison Civic chorus.

His wife is the former Fern Abraham, trumpet player in the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra. She was solo cornetist with the University of Wisconsin band in 1948, and was soloist with the symphony last year.

Don's brothers are Vernon, who plays oboe and English horn; Robert, clarinet; Neal, flute, and Wendell, flute and violin.

Don started music as a hobby, and it's still a hobby. His job is instructor in the university extension division, where he works with the Industrial Management institute program.

It began at Baraboo, where he played baritone in the junior high school band. When the family moved to Madison, he continued on the same instrument at Central high school, but switched to bassoon when he was in 11th grade.

Don played in Central's band and orchestra and attended several Summer Music clinics at the university. In 1941, he won a four-year university scholarship for his clinic work.

On the campus, Don played five years with the University band and orchestra, and was president of the latter in 1948. He joined the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra in 1940, and was its president in 1950.

He has also been a member of the Overture Legion band and the Madison Musicians Assn. band; has played with the La Crosse, Milton College, and Wausau Symphonies; directs the choir at Trousdale Methodist church; organized and directed a German band on the campus, and played in woodwind ensembles at the university and with the Madison orchestra.

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
