



TIP O' THE MORNING: An address by President Eisenhower will be broadcast by NBC Thursday night.

MORE THAN 3,000 school musicians and vocalists from throughout Wisconsin are expected to attend the annual Wisconsin Solo-Ensemble festival Saturday at the University of Wisconsin, Prof. Emmett Sarig, music specialist, announced Sunday.

The festival is sponsored by the Wisconsin School Music Assn. in cooperation with the University of Wisconsin extension division. H. C. Wegner, Madison, executive secretary of the WSMA, said that a total of some 86,000 pupils will have taken part in the preliminary district festivals in 26 Wisconsin communities.

An added incentive to pupils who participate in the state festival will be the awarding of 17 scholarships for the 1953 Summer Music clinic conducted by the extension division. Of the scholarships, 10 will be granted by the WSMA and seven by the office of the music specialist, extension division.

Several pieces of pottery by Aaron Bohrod, artist-in-residence at the University of Wisconsin, and F. Carleton Ball, former member of the University staff, have been chosen by the Smithsonian museum, Washington, D. C., for the circulating collection to be shown in leading U. S. art museums during the coming year.

The pieces were chosen while they were on exhibit at Cranbrook academy, Bloomfield Hills, Mich., and at the galleries of the University of Illinois. The Illinois gallery has purchased a large stoneware pottery vase by the artists, called "Stoneware Faces," for its permanent collection.

Bohrod's designs, "Country Auction" and "Pagan Magic," have been imprinted on drapery fabrics and are now available in fabric departments across the country.

Gerhart Hauptmann's "The Beaver Coat—A Comedy of Thieves" will be presented in German by the University of Wisconsin department of German this week. The play will be given in the Play Circle at 8 p. m. Tuesday and Wednesday. Admission will be free; tickets are available at the Wisconsin Union boxoffice and at 83 Bascom hall.

Mutual's Chicago Theater of the Air will inaugurate its 1953 summer-time concert series on Saturday. Lyric soprano Nancy Carr will be the featured artist for the initial broadcast. Baritone Earle Wilkie will be co-starred.

The "career performance" segments of these programs, provided by the Chicago Theater of the Air, will be broadcast on Saturday.

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Model Threatens Suicide Jump, Finally Gives In

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—A pretty model yielded to persuasion Sunday after spending about seven hours atop a 140-foot water tower and climbed down instead of jumping as she had threatened.

As the hours passed a large crowd gathered at the base of the tower on a hill overlooking Santa Monica. The brunette model, Theresa Terry C. McKinney, 20, climbed the ladder of the tower this morning and perched at the peak of a conical roof.

She was persuaded to come down by Col. Robert Bertram, 21, of Los Angeles, stationed at Camp Roberts, who climbed the tower to talk with her. He said he had been going with Mrs. McKinney but told her Saturday night it would be better if they broke off their relationship.

During the morning and afternoon several persons, including a Catholic priest and a Presbyterian minister, climbed up to a position near Mrs. McKinney and attempted to persuade her to abandon the idea of jumping.

"Go away and leave me alone," the divorcée told those who had attempted to reach her atop the tower. "It's not your life."

The mother said her daughter had not been depressed and that she was unable to explain her actions. Mrs. McKinney, who lives with her mother and stepfather, is the mother of two sons, Michael, 3, and Robert, 2.
