Atomic Connons Moved to May 23 Test Site

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (P-Two monster atomic cannons were mov-ed Sunday to the firing site from which the world's first atomic artillery shell will be fired into Frenchman flat on May 23.

The 280-millimeter howitzers,

each of which weighs 85 tons, were driven to a firing site seven miles south of the barren desert dry lake inside the southern Nevada atomic test site under their own power Saturday.
