Today, the opposite is true. The singer is the star, with few exceptions, and the orchestra is incidental—although a good band can make or break a vocal record-

ing.
This appears to have led to three

things:
ONE. The singer's effort to create a new and distinctive sound, even though it may be no more

ate a new and distinctive sound, even though it may be no more than an extreme "pushing" of his voice;

TWO. A new and laudable emphasis on lyric writing—for, if a song is to sell on the basis of the singer's rather than the orchestra's delivery it must have either clever or easily remembered words; and "THREE Contrariwise, an occasionel success for a purely instrumental number—"Sleigh Ride" and "Blue Tango" are cases in point. The sad part about this is that too often, when the instrumental's sales start to slump, somebody comes up with lyrics, usually inane.

*** Barbara Ruick (MGM): "Now That I'M in Love." a clever song based on part of the "William Tell" overture, and "Ghl-Li," a pleasant Oriental-type tune. We're still pulling for this gal to find the one tune that will really put her over.


