THIRTEEN members of the Edgewood high school band have played with that organization during all their four years of high school. During that time, the band has compiled a remarkable record. Four years ago, it entered a district music festival for the first time, playing in Class D, and won a first-division rating. Three years ago, it moved up to Class C, and again took a first-division rating. Two years ago it progressed to Class B, and made the first division.

This year, the band entered Class A, and again was rated a first-division unit. On top of that (as we told you Tuesday), it won permanent possession of the Catholic War Veteran's state championship trophy this spring by taking first place in competition for the third straight year. At 8 tonight and again at 8 p.m. Thursday, the band will join the Catholic All-City and the Catholic All-City Cadet bands in a concert in Edgewood auditorium.

Elmer Ziegler will conduct. **RECITAL:** George E. Becker Jr., graduate student from Stoughton, will play his graduate piano recital in Music hall on the University of Wisconsin campus at 8 p.m. Friday. It will be open to the public. The program will include "Toccata in C Minor," Bach; "Sonata in B Flat Major, K. 570," Mozart; "Two Elegies," Bartok; "Sonata in B Minor, Opus 58," Chopin. Becker is a major in music who has several campus concert appearances to his credit. In the spring of 1951 for his senior recital he played the Grieg concerto for piano and orchestra assisted by the University Symphony. Last November he was soloist for the symphony concert in the Wisconsin Union theater, playing Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue."

MUSIC IN THE NORTH: The Manhattan trio will give a series of bi-weekly concerts at Eagle River beginning July 13, and will play also at Rhinelander and Minocqua. Disbanded Guard Unit Files Claim on Armory
WISCONSIN RAPIDS (AP) — A World War II National Guard unit, since disbanded, Tuesday began legal action to recover an equity it claims it has in an armory turned over to the state by calling Mayor Carl C. Knudson for an adverse examination. The business association of Battery E, 120th field artillery said terms of the agreement by which it gave \$8,500 and two parcels of land to the city for the armory stipulated the city retain permanent title to the property. This year the armory was turned over to the state and the association claimed a violation of the agreement. Mayor Knudson was ordered to appear before Circuit Court Commissioner Gerald W. Hiert, Monday. He will be asked to furnish information on which the association can base a suit to recover its interest in the building.

Man Gets Probation in Power Saw Theft
Alfred Porter, 43, Nichols rd., was placed on probation for one year Tuesday by Superior Judge Roy H. Proctor for receiving and concealing a \$300 power saw stolen from a Humphrey, Tree Expert Co. truck last January. According to Asst. Dist. Atty. Clean Henry, Porter sold the saw to a Sherman ave. resident who was spotted by an employe of the tree company while the resident was using the saw. Porter said a man unknown to him had sold him the saw for \$10.
