"MODERN MUSIC"—To judge how modern a piece of music is by the amount of dissonance, atonality, or starkness in it is to judge the piece inaccurately, says music editor Richard Williams in the June issue of House Beautiful magazine, which discusses the question, "How Modern is Modern Music?"

According to Williams, "Modern" in music seems to be a relative term, subjective classification which depends on one's own taste, tolerance, and knowledge.

"Can we agree," Williams asks, "that modern music is music composed in our century which in style and thought breaks away from the previous great school, the Romantic? Faulty though this definition may be, it will serve to point out that that is precisely the kind of music which the fittest people like."

Before you decide that you don't like modern music, the author suggests that you become acquainted with Sibelius, whom he describes as "an arch, wide and firm, standing midway between the 19th and 20th centuries, bestriding both romanticism and modernity."

Williams says that Sibelius' "Finlandia" and "The Swan of Tuonela" are "outfit works, as romantic as can be. But he adds that the composer's violin concerto, written 50 years ago, is a masterpiece of modern music and one of the most popular in today's violin repertoire.

New compositions, he adds, take about 10 years before they're appreciated, 25 to begin permanence, and 50 to become "classics." So, if you do not like a new work at first, don't conclude that modern music is not for you; give yourself time to appraise it carefully, Williams advised.

LONDON (AP)—Queen Elizabeth visited Westminster Abbey again Thursday to watch her second rehearsal for her coronation June 2.

Graduation time has finally arrived. High school with all its activities will soon be only a memory.

But what of the future? Have you given any thought to the years to come?

As a career, nursing has never been more promising.

Nurses are needed today as never before to staff the growing health services vital to the welfare of our citizens and our state. And this demand for qualified nurses will continue to outnumber the supply for years to come.

In nursing one can easily find a field to suit her interests and aptitudes. The range of positions is wide and varied—hospital staff nursing, public health nursing, industrial nursing, pediatric nursing,—to name but a few.

The demand for nurses in public health is especially great today. Every community needs their services for at least three basic purposes; the prevention and control of disease, the care of the sick in the home, and family health guidance.

Teaching people the value of medical care, assisting expectant mothers in preparing for their babies, helping families protect the health of the pre-school and the school child, are but a few of the many stimulating daily activities of the public health nurse.

Wisconsin realizes the value of the public health nurse and has enacted laws enabling counties, townships, cities, and schools to employ public health nurses to conduct community health programs.

To reasonably meet the needs one nurse is required for every 5,000 people in each community. The Visiting Nurse Association is supplying many of these services in some areas of our state, but the need for public health nurses will continue. Your State Board of Health can supply you with further information concerning the educational and personal requirements for a career in this field.

Public health nursing is not an easy road to success. One works hard, both in school and after graduation; but the satisfaction of aiding people to achieve a healthier, happier life is worth it.

At the Shows

Capitol

FEATURE: Androcles and the Lion.

TYPE: Comedy.

REVIEWER: Don Davies.

CAST: Androcles, Alan Young; Lavinia, Jean Simmons; Roman Captain, Victor Mature; Faravious, Robert Newton; Caesar, Maurice Evans.

PLOT: Adapted from Shaw's classic tale of the timid Christian tailor who saves his fellow Christian martyrs from death in the Roman arena at the hands of a lion, Androcles befriends a lion with a thorn in its paw while escaping from Roman guards. Along with other Christians, Androcles is taken prisoner and the group led away to become lion bait in the games at the Coliseum. The events that befall the small Christian group and their Roman captors lead to some novel entertainments.

HIGH POINTS: Delightful and witty dialogue by a well-rounded cast, especially by the performances of Newton and Miss Simmons.

LOW POINTS: Extending Shaw's play to a feature length picture loses some of the sharp Shawian wit to slapstick, although enough of the thought-provoking satire remains.

VERDICT: Not entirely Shaw, but with much merit.

CO-FEATURE: Cl of the Hunted, starring Victoria Gassman, Barry Sullivan, and Folly Bergen.

VERDICT: An adventure tale that has theme of the good in men struggling with circumstance, carrying theme and story out with success and some fine acting, but with weak ending.

Orpheum

FEATURE: The President's Lady

TYPE: Historical drama

CAST: Rachel Jackson, Susan Hayward; Andrew Jackson, Carlton Heston, also Fay Bainter, James Best, and John McIntire.

PLOT: Based on Irving Stone's novel, this is the story of Rachel and Andrew Jackson's love from the time they met until his inauguration as President. Told as seen through Rachel's eyes, the story emphasizes their personal relationship above national events of the era.

HIGH POINTS: Realistic portrayal of life in early America... excellent pictures of the Hermitage, Jackson's home... mature treatment of character.

LOW POINTS: Too many exciting incidents in rapid succession.

VERDICT: Excellent adult entertainment.

Siamese Twin Sister Shares Other's Surgery

BOSTON (AP)—Margaret and Mary Gibb, 41-year-old Siamese twins, arrived at the New England Deaconess Hospital Thursday for an operation on one that will require anasthetic for both.

Dr. Frank H. Lahey will perform abdominal surgery on Margaret Saturday while her sister lies on an adjoining operating table.

The twins, former circus and stage attractions, now are living in retirement Holyoke. Joined at the base of their spines, they share a common circulatory system.

Their parents twice decided against risking an operation to separate them, once when they were 3 years old and again in 1928.

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
