

Bill Doudna's SPOTLIGHT Hagen Circus

DESPITE THREATENING weather, Hagen Brothers circus had to give an extra performance Sunday afternoon at the Dane county fairgrounds...

Headlined by the Reynoso duo of Mexico, the performance was circusy and smooth-running. A comparatively small troupe, the Hagen organization put a lot of entertainment before its audiences...

Capt. Bert Wallace, the equestrian director, kept it going at a steady pace in spite of a shortage of laborers. His own work with Liberty horses and Mrs. Wallace's trained dogs were among the most entertaining numbers.

Each of the Reynosos did a spectacular act of his own, then closed the show with an iron-jaw exhibition full of skill and excitement. At one point, Francisco hung by his knees from one trapeze while Cardona performed on a second one held in Francisco's teeth.

The show also include Dixie, a well trained elephant; a contortionist and others on trapezes; deers that danced, skipped rope, and walked a tight-wire; ponies, dancing horses, a perch act, wire-walkers, acrobats, an aerial ballet, and clowns, the weakest part of the program.

Costumes were always neat and fresh-looking, some of them big show style. Everybody on the show seemed to be having a good time at work.

Another performance was scheduled Sunday night, and two will be given today—at 4:30 and 8 p.m.

U.S. Has New Plan for Returning POWs WASHINGTON (AP)—Defense Department sources disclosed a new plan Sunday for bringing future American prisoners of war back home without segregating those suspected of having "succumbed" to Communism.

The plan—still subject to top-level approval but almost certain of acceptance—would avoid the pitfalls of the first prisoner exchange last month. At that time the military encountered a storm of public protest for segregating and pinning a "Red label" on released Americans.

Defense Department spokesmen said that in the future all prisoners of war will be treated and returned alike.

The new plan is based on experience gained from the return of the group of 149 released Americans. It also reflects the general feeling now that the much-discussed Communist "brainwashing" technique has been overestimated at least in the extent it was used on American POW's, the spokesmen said.
