**'Good Times' Disc Rated High**

One of the hottest new records, from a sales standpoint, seems to be Guy Mitchell's and Mandy Patinkin's "Tell Us Where the Good Times Are." You've been hearing it on the radio stations, and it's a good bet that it will have one of the biggest juke-box plays of any disc in years.

Main reason is that it's a bright, rollicking tune with simple lyrics, done joyously by the singers with Mitch Miller's usual originality in the background. The second side has a country novelty called "There's Nothing as Sweet as My Baby," (Columbia).

Other recent, recommended "pop" records:

Ginny Gibson (MGM): "Unless You're Really Mine," novelty tune, and "Lonely Lover," ballad.

Sammy Kaye orchestra (Columbia): "Tattle Tale Duet," another novelty with vocal by Jeffrey Clay, and "Orange Blossom Serenade," smooth instrumental.

Percy Faith orchestra (Columbia): "Return to Paradise," movie background music by Dmitri Tiomkin, with lyric by Ned Washington. Both sides of a 10-inch 78 RPM disc.

Judy Garland (Columbia): "Send My Baby Back to Me," sparkling ditty, and "Without a Memory," ballad. A good start for Judy on the Columbia label.

Elliott Brothers orchestra (MGM): "12th St. Rag" and "In the Mood," both highly danceable.

Bunk Johnson (Columbia): This is a memorial LP to the New Orleans musician who died in 1949. Recorded in an empty hall at a special session two years before Johnson's death, the music is solid jazz. Tops are "Chloe," "Some of These Days," "You're Drivin' Me Crazy."

Benny Goodman trio (Columbia): Another LP with Goodman, Teddy Wilson, and Gene Krupa at their best in a performance recorded at a Fletcher Henderson Fund broadcast two years ago. You'll hear Buck Clayton, Eddie Sefranski, and John Smith on some of the numbers.

Mitch Miller orchestra (Columbia): "Tira Lira Madeira," with unusual instrumentation, and "Oriental Polka."

Benny Goodman orchestra (Columbia): "I'll Never Say Never Again" and "What a Little Moonlight Can Do," with vocals by Helen Ward. This is the new Goodman band which played here recently (without Goodman). Both sides have good solos by Benny.

Jack Fink orchestra (MGM): "Tin Pan Alley Rag" and "Oceana Roll." The former is good listening, but after hearing Beatrice Kay, you'll never be satisfied with any other "Oceana Roll."

**Driver Ants Terrorize Africa**

Recently I showed a group of boys and girls a somewhat strange picture of wild animals. In the drawing they saw dozens of beasts in Africa, and all were running in the same direction. Here are a few of the questions which were asked:

"What kinds of animals are running together? Why do they all run in the same direction? What are they running away from? Why do they look so mad?"

In the picture the artist placed elephants, gorillas and gazelles, along with such other animals as the giraffe, the warthog, the lion and the leopard.

**Fleeing from Ants**

As to why the animals "look so mad," the only way I can explain it is to say that the artist wanted to show them as being fearful.

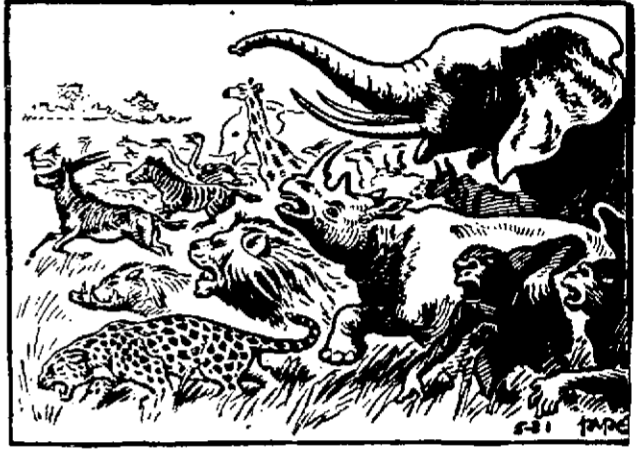
When driver ants are behind them, they try to escape. Instinct, or something of the sort, tells them that they must seek water if they are to be safe from the ants.

**Driver ants are a terror in Africa.** They gather in columns which are thousands of feet long. Most of the ants in a column are blind workers, but there are males and queens which seem to guide them. Onward and onward march these ants. When they come upon any form of animal life, they start to eat it up. The size of an animal seems to mean nothing to them. Leopards, for example, have been slain, and have been devoured down to the bones and fur.

**Alarm in Jungle**

Such a swarm of beasts as the artist pictures will seldom, if ever, be packed together, but the idea is correct. Not only enemies are filled with fear, and run together without fighting during the flight. Human beings also fear the driver ants. When an alarm comes, they leave their homes. They may be routed from their beds. Seizing what food they can carry, they go to the nearest body of water—commonly a river or lake—and find safety some distance from the shore. A village becomes a deserted place while the ants take over, eating all the food they can find in the dwellings.

Many persons in the tropics are glad to have an invasion of driver ants. When they return to their homes, after being away a few days, they find that the ants have gone. They also find that their homes have been cleared of rats and mice, and insects pests have been destroyed or driven out.
