WHERE ARE THEY? Radio listeners who hear Dave Garroway on NBC-WIBA are participating in a brand new contest recently started by the general star.

On the premise that many listeners interested in knowing the whereabouts and activities of persons who were once prominent in the headlines, Dave decided to offer prizes to members of his audience who sent in the best letters telling about such former top news-makers and how they are currently occupied.

His assumption proved correct, for at the end of the first week Dave and his staff were busy opening over 1,000 letters. The contest will be in effect through June 20 and prizes will be 20 RCA Victor radios.

Among those personalities already discussed on the program have been Fritz Schiff, singing sensation in the early years of the 20th Century who is living in New York and still appears occasionally in local clubs; the original Miss America who is now Mrs. Cahill and is living in Washington, D. C. with her husband and children; Jimmy McLean, the original "Dr. I.Q." of radio fame who is now a minister; and Corporal Bill Church, the original Spanky in the "Our Gang" comedies.

COMPETITION FOR COMPOSERS: Three contest awards, totaling \$3,000, for original musical compositions by United States citizens have been announced by the National Symphony orchestra of Washington, D. C.

The contest, which will offer \$2,000 for a symphony, \$1,000 for an extended composition and \$800 for an overture, is scheduled to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the founding of the orchestra in 1931 by the late Hans Knudsen.

Five thousand brochures are being mailed this week to U. S. composers who are native born or naturalized citizens. The contest information is also being sent to schools of music, conservatories, and universities throughout the country.

Conductor Howard Mitchell plans to present performances of the winning compositions during the National Symphony's 1955-56 season of concerts in the nation's capital.

Although two judging panels of nationally known musicians will pass on the entries, names of the judges will not be revealed until after the contest, according to Emerson Meyers, chairman of the National Symphony Orchestra Assn's composition contest committee.

Composition must be submitted in full orchestral score. The symphony should run approximately 30 to 15 minutes of actual playing time. The extended piece may take the form of a tone poem, symphonic poem, or suite of 15 to 20 minutes. Duration of the overture is limited to from 10 to 15 minutes playing time. Overture entries may be submitted only by entrants living within a 50-mile radius of Washington, D. C.

Manuscripts for all classes of entries should be submitted between Oct. 1, 1954, and Jan. 1, 1955.

Information on conditions and rules of the contest may be obtained from the National Symphony Orchestra Assn., 2002 P. St., N. W., Washington, D. C.


