A HUNDRED Indians from a dozen tribes will stage their first ceremonial of the summer at 8:30 p. m. Saturday, June 27, at Stand Rock amphitheater, on the Wisconsin river north of Wisconsin Dells.

The program, directed by Phyllis Crandall Connor, will be presented at 8:30 each night through Labor Day. The ceremonials are sponsored by the Dells post of the American Legion.

The setting is unique. It is a natural theater, with a high cliff serving as the backdrop for the dances, music, and ceremonies. The sky is the ceiling, and a terraced slope opposite the cliff holds 2,000 seats for the audience.

Surprisingly, no public address system is needed. The amphitheater's acoustical properties permit even whispered words to be heard by the watchers. For light, however, the ceremonials borrow from the 20th century. A modern theater switchboard controls spotlights, floodlights, and the general lighting before and after the performances.

Audiences totaling 80,000 persons are expected to attend the ceremonials this summer. The amphitheater can be reached by auto or by the Clipper Winnebago, which makes the 5-mile river trip each night with its

PLOT: Rommel's African Army is advancing towards Egypt and its objective is the Suez Canal during the campaign in the summer of 1941.
