

Listening to Organ Concertos By RUTH PILGER ANDREWS Madison Organist Compositions in which the organ is used in Knolen The fifth of the content of the co

Compositions in which the organ is used in combination with other instruments have always brought a thrill to an audience, even if the listeners are not particularly interested in organ music. The grandeur and majesty of the organ are the more dramatically brought out when ed with a piano, a chamber orchestra, or full

The contrast between the organ and other inthe contrast between the organ and other in-struments is especially striking when the organ enters after a long introduction or interlude, when the organ has a pedal cadenza, and when full organ and full orchestra play the final measures together. The organ tones are then unex-pected and sometimes breathtaking but always

satisfying.
George Frederic Handel is said to have been

George Frederic Handel is said to have been the first to use the organ in concerted music with other instruments. However, as early as 1600 small portative organs were used in combination with the lyre, harp, viols, and other instruments. Handel first played one of his organ concertos at the first public performance of his oratorio. "Esther," at Covent Garden in 1732. It is thought that this concerto was Opus 4, No. 2 in B-flat, which together with Opus 4, No. 1 in G-minor, has been played and recorded by Jeanne Demessieux. The orchestra playing with Mile. Demessieux was "L'Orchestre de la Suisse Romande," and the London LP recording was conducted by Ernst Ansermet.

Another recording of organ with other instruments is Mozart's "Three Church Sonatas," one of which was composed in 1769 when Mozart was only 13. The sonatas are three of his 17 "Church" or "Epistle" sonatas, intended for use as part of the ceremony of the Mass and written at various times in his career. The Mercury LP recording was played by the organist Heinrich Wismeyer and a chamber orchestra under Joseph Kugler.

On the same record is a cantata by Dietrich

On the same record is a cantata by Dietrich Buxtehude, "Ailes was ihr tut," (Everything that

you do), performed by the Bavarian Radio chots and orchestra, also under the direction of Mr. Kugler. The fifth of the seven movements in the cantata is the most elaborate and opens bass solo accompanied by organ, with the strings

bass solo accompanied by organ, with the strings entering as an antiphonal choir.

On May 19, 1886, Camille Saint-Saens' "Symphony No. 3 in C Minor." the "organ symphony," had its first performance, and was played by the London Philharmonic orchestra under the direction of the composer. The unusual symphony was an immediate success and was performed the following February by the New York Philharmonic orchestra conducted by Theodore Thomas.

Critics have never placed Saint-Saens among

Critics have never placed Saint-Saens among the greatest composers but they know that he was one of France's most polished and versatile musicians. The "organ symphony" has an appeal to the intellect as well as to the emotions. Both the Saint-Saens work and the Poulenc organ concerto use the organ as an instrument which plays a distinct and exciting solo part, whereas the organ in the works of the classic composers is sometimes so much a part of the orchestra that one forgets that it is the solo instrument.

The Saint-Saens organ symphony was recorded on Columbia LP by the Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra of New York, with Charles Muench conducting and Edouard Nies-Berger at

A 20th century example of the organ concerto is Francis Poulenc's "Concerto in G Minor for Organ. String Orchestra, and Tympani." In this work the organ is truly a magnificent instrument and there is hardly a moment when the mind can relax from the powerful, unexpected, with and spirited music that pours forth.

Columbia produced the LP recording of Poul-

en's concerto, with E. Power Biggs at the or-gan and Richard Burgin conducting the Columbia Symphony orchestra.

On the other side of this record are Cesar Franck's "Prelude, Fugue, and Variation" and "Piece Heroique," played by Biggs.
