Bill Doudan's SPOTLIGHT Art Shows

TIP O' THE MORNING: Mickey Spillane, mystery writer, and Clyde Beatty, circus owner, will star in "Man Killer," to be filmed on location with Beatty's circus.

AN EXHIBITION CALLED "Contemporary American Drawing" will open July 15 at the Memorial Union—the closing date of a one-man show of paintings and graphics by Richard D. Houghton, Jr., Madison.

The Houghton show is in the main lounge of the Union. The 85 drawings—one each from the best known and most qualified artists of the U. S., according to Prof. Warrington Colecott, of the art education faculty—will be exhibited in the main and theater galleries through Aug. 20.

The University of Wisconsin faculty selected the drawings and invited the artists to send their works. With the exception of Artist-in-Residence Aaron Bohrod, all of the exhibitors are from out of state.

No size limit was set, and the definition of drawing was left to the interpretation of the artist. The result will be a lively show, says Colecott, varying in size from Edward Dugmore's yard-and-a-half high scroll, "Lumber Five," and a huge "Banjo Player," by Francis de Erdelyi, to Hyman Bloom's small line study, "The Medium."

There are several drawings in color. Noteworthy are Joyce Treiman's "Bird Man," and a blue wash drawing by Leonard Edmondson. Among the outstanding works of the younger and less well-known artists are drawings by John McNeel, Dave McCosh, Robert Knipschild (former University of Wisconsin student, now in New York), and Stephen Face.

Among the more established painters are "Gargyle," by Morris Graves; a "Toledo," by Robert Motherwell, and a brown wash drawing, "Evening," by Adolph Gottlieb.

Sculptors contributed some of the most powerful drawings, Colecott says. Among these are David Smith's purple ink drawing, and work by David Hare, Jacques Lipschitz, and Richard O'Hanlon.

Houghton, a curator of exhibits in the museum of the State Historical Society, was one of only five Wisconsin painters admitted to the Metropolitan Museum of Art's nationwide competition two years ago. In March of this year he won the medal of honor and a \$100 prize for the best work in the 1953 Wisconsin Painters and Sculptors, Inc., exhibition at the Milwaukee Art Institute.

"Venus," the prize winning oil, is on exhibit at the Memorial Union.

The oil paintings in the show are semi-abstract or abstract, while the prints and watercolors are in a more realistic vein. All

WTMJ-TV Switches to Channel 4 Saturday

MILWAUKEE (UP)—The switch from Channel 3 to Channel 4 will be made by WTMJ-TV, the Milwaukee Journal's television station, during a special program next Saturday night.

The switchover, which will put into use the station's new 1,035 foot tower, will come during a special program from 7 to 7:30 p. m.

The new tower, and a boost in power from the present 16 kilowatts to 100 kilowatts, is expected to increase the station's signal to an area of about 90 miles.

Film taken in eight Wisconsin cities will be shown on the program.

They are Sheboygan, Manitowish, Appleton, Oshkosh, Beaver Dam, Madison, Monroe and Janesville—all formerly on or outside of WTMJ-TV fringe area. Now they will be inside and are expected to receive a satisfactory television image.
