Whole Cast Provides a Lift as 'She Stoops to Conquer'

The Repertory Theater cast of "She Stoops to Conquer" lifted the curtain on a rare bit of 18th Century comedy Wednesday night and filled two hours with a much-applauded performance.

The largest opening night crowd of the season witnessed the group's presentation of Oliver Goldsmith's time-tested play, showing its appreciation with laughter throughout and several curtain calls.

With the comedy providing several satisfying roles, instead of the usual two or three, the success of the play was pretty much a tribute to the entire cast.

Following their fine work of last week in "Angel Street," Helen Lauritzen and Charles Mark made it two in a row with equally gratifying portrayals as Mr. and Mrs. Hardecastle.

Mark glided the old Squire's role with some teen-age ball mannerisms, highlighted by a stooped posture of age and twitching long-stemmed pipe, and his wife, Miss Lauritzen, flitted from side to side, conveying the bird-like movements of the anxious mother unconcerned with anything that didn't pertain to the hoped-for marriage of her rebellious son.

Irving Cummings, as Tony Lumpkin, her son by a previous marriage, lifted humor out of all his actions and schemes to evade the pairing knot so carefully provided by his dotting mother with a cousin, Constance Neville, played by Donna Wenger.

The Hardecastle daughter, Kate, played by Anne Soule, registered a complete characterization in both her role as daughter and pretended barmaid.

Don Soule, as Marlow, her suitor, and Don Phelps, playing Hastings, provided some of the best comedy bits, in particular, the scene in which Marlow meets Kate for the first time and was bolstered in his shy conversation by the more worldly-wise Hastings.

The storm broke 45 minutes before Mr. Truman, en route to Independence, Mo., after attending funeral services in Boston for former Labor Secretary Maurice Tobin, was due to arrive.

The twin-engined TWA plane circled over Butler, Pa., 18 miles north of Pittsburgh, and out of the storm area, awaiting clearance for a landing at Greater Pittsburgh Airport.

The former chief executive was the first off the plane at the airport. He appeared untroubled by the storm and the delay.

"I enjoyed the trip very much," he said. "I didn't even know there was a storm."

TV Towers on Chimneys Called Hazard

Television towers which have been erected on chimneys in Madison have been declared a fire hazard, and must be removed, Building Inspection Supt. Ray F. Burt disclosed Wednesday afternoon.

Burt said that recent investigations have revealed that blowing by lightning and the tower's swaying in the wind have cracked some chimneys, thereby creating a fire hazard during the heating season.

Burt's inspectors estimate that between 200 and 250 permits have been issued for chimney TV towers before the City Council recently adopted the new radio, television, and electronics ordinance. He said applicants were warned at the time the permits were issued that they might have to remove the towers from the chimney.

A building inspectors find chimney owners, the Building Department will issue orders for the change, Burt said, but he advised residents to make the change without an order to eliminate the possibilities of a fire.

Relocating the same antenna on another part of the roof will not require another permit, but a new antenna will require a new permit.

Burt said chimney towers were permitted in the past because they had no ordinance covering them until the council's recent action.

He pointed out that a state law prohibits that type of tower on apartment buildings containing three or more units.

A check of some towers which have received lightning strikes have revealed internal cracks in the chimneys a slight swaying in the wind was enough to cause cracks at the roof line.
