Park Drive Opening Delayed Till August

The last section of the Law park drive will not be open to traffic until late in August, when the rail crossing at S. Bedford st. will be completed, Mayor George Forster said Tuesday afternoon.

Acting City Engineer Wilbur Peterson said the railroad has yet to install safety devices at the crossing in addition to relocating some of its switching tracks.

The mayor said railroad officials informed him that a delay in another project had prevented completion of the work by the mid-July deadline which had previously been set.

Peterson said the city has completed work on the last section of the new parkway from S. Broom st. to Bedford, and is ready for traffic as soon as the railroad completes its work.

Opening of the drive will give the city a thoroughway from S. Blair st. along the lake front to W. Washington ave. over Proudfoot st.
