# 'The Condition of U.S. Art'

The Sunday Spotlight: A Guest Column

The art education department of the University of Wisconsin is sponsoring, with the collaboration of the Wisconsin Union gallery committee, an exhibition of contemporary American drawings in the galleries of the Memorial Union. This continues the policy of sponsoring summer exhibitions of national scope which the department originated four

years ago. This year the exhibition committee of the department decided to organize an exhibition of drawings, since the department has always placed the utmost emphasis on drawing as a basic process in the training of both professional artists and the

Department members visited WILDE galleries in New York City so that a cross-section representation of the best productions of contem-porary American draughtsmen could be viewed elected to exhibit.

Efforts on the part of the art education department and people concerned in no way seem misspent, for the resulting exhibition is indeed stimulating. Only too often is the art of drawing consider-

Only too often is the art of drawing considered but the preparatory material of the artist, something to be discarded and disregarded after they have served their purpose toward too consumated work. In reality it should be considered as the very basis of this consumated work—the care of the art and the most intimale approach between the observer and the work of possible between the observer and the work of art or the artist himself.

As an artist draws, so stands the worth of all his other productions. The reed pen of Rembrandt explains his genius much more rapidly than the mysterious magnificence of his brush; the silverpoint of Leonardo points inextricably to his universal probing; the intricacies of the drawings of Frank Lloyd Wright explain a great ideal of the angingering precision and invention ical of the engineering precision and invention

of his work.

For here is a manifestation of the possibilities of human intellect, a concreting of the potentialities of reason and the transcending of the very results of reason to new heights of the human mind. Yet at the same time, in drawings, we can see the artist at his least pretentious self, most directly and pointedly, most humbly, most delighting in the lov of his facility most intimdelighting in the joy of his facility; most intimately, in a word.

In the drawings of this exhibition all of these qualities exist to a greater or lesser degree. the best known or most widely accepted artists. In a few cases works by certain individuals were sought but were for one reason or another unavailable. Many names will be unfamiliar. The committee decided to invite only works from outside the state (with the exception of the university artist in residence. Asron Bohmod). All of the phases of contemporary American art are well represented. Whether one looks for abstract expressionism (the New York school), the pure abstract (non-objective), pure expressionism, magic realism and its predecessor surrealism, down-right reality or unqualified pictorialism, etc., he can find what he searches for here.

This quality of the composite was not particularly of the composite was not partic

niarly looked for by the committee—it is only the natural result of attempting to collect a qual-ity representation of contemporary American

drawing. In my opinion the following works stand out

In my opinion the following works stand out as being particularly excellent and integral:

A dashing lanscape in pen and ink by Jos Jones, even though perhaps obviously under the infuence of Dufy: a vibrant pen rendering of a viaduct by Lionel Feininger: Stephen Greene's "Skeletors"; a most exquisitely refined pen drawing called "Chopping" by Robert Gwathmey: Philip Evergood's blunt and unpretentious pencil drawing, "Lady on a Stool"; a tender pencil drawing, "Lady on a Stool"; a tender pencil drawing by the late Yasuo Kunyoshi; a gnarled and embittered carly (1930) George Grosz pen and ink called "Civil War"; a delightful group of little calligraphs by Ezio Martinelli; two happy "Poodles" in myriad dots by Dudley Huppler; a highly unsavory but consummate "Nature Study" by Kurt Seligman: a finished "Roman Fantasy" by Eugene Berman; Gregorio Prestoping's violent "Machinist"; a soft and atmospheric pen and wash "Mussel Growers at Chatelaillon" by Leonid, and somehow the sheer insult quality of the wash drawing by Robert Motherwell.

Weak and disappointing are these few: a drawing by Fred Conway, affected and pretentious; a drawing by the quite excellent sculptor Charles Umlauf, which struck me as being heavy and tasteless; a rather stumbling "Pictograph" by John Heliker, in opinion one of our outstanding abstract painters; a head by Jack Levine in which the virtue of direct wash is not quite virtuous; a Karl Zerbe which tastelessly gets too involved with conscious selection of paper and media.

Certainly there are other excellent drawings and other bad ones—and the viewers opinion will and should be quite opposed to mine.

One quality is strikingly certain, however, and I feel any serious observer will have this same feeling: excellence is positively not limited to any one means of expression, nor on the other hand is mediocrity. One will find either one of these qualities in almost any phase—be it the purely non-objectively at one pole or the purely represent

sentational at the other.

Indeed, here in this exhibition one can again see that the quality of excellence transcends always the temporary nature of fashion.




