Uncle Ray's Corner

Goose Is No 'Silly'



There are persons who speak with speeds of from 50 to 100 miles an hour. In the autumn, while they are flying southward, they are flying with a speed of from 10 to 20 miles an hour. It is a mistake to call names in any case, there is an error in the expression. A goose is far from being a "silly" bird. It ranks among the birds which are "smarter than the average."

Instead of flying in dense flocks, or swarms, wild geese use a V formation. A man with a shotgun seldom brings down more than one or two, even if he makes a good shot.

At the head of the "V" is a bird which sportsmen describe as an ordinary length of from three feet to three and a half feet. It nests, or seems to be treated with respect, where he keeps the others follow.

Although hunters bring down some wild geese each year, they find it hard, almost impossible, to hit them while they are in the midst of a long flight. These big birds like to fly at heights of from half a mile to a mile, far out of range of shotguns. When hunters do bring them down, it is almost always while the birds are rising from the ground, or when they are coming to rest.

Geese make regular migrations. They may be seen flying northward in the spring, often at least a few in southern Wis-

New Theater Group Praised

For the first time in many years, Madison this summer has had two groups of actors in action. Wisconsin Players had a first-rate season, but that was hardly news; some of that organization's best work over the years has been in its summer playbill.

What was new was the appearance of the Repertory Theater in plays at the Woman's bldg. Its season will end this week with a group of three one-act plays.

Of the six plays given so far, I saw exactly half. Don Davies reviewed two of the others and another was skipped through force of circumstances. On the basis of experience and the reports of other playgoers, I can say that the company and its productions were far too good for the usually meager attendance.

To me, the most striking thing about the season was the emergence of Anne Seule as an actress of great power and considerable versatility. True, she had been seen with Wisconsin Players, but not until this summer had many of us appreciated her ability.

Her work in "A Doll's House," as has been noted here, was one of the season's peaks.

Her husband, Don, we already knew as a conscientious actor, whether as the swashbuckling Petruccio of "The Taming of the Shrew" or in a quieter role. Others in the company were as good as we had expected them to be, although Charles Mark managed to play some of this parts down almost to a juvenile level.

Helen Lauritzen recovered in mid-season from her apparent affinity for "The Madwoman of Chailoil," and in "A Doll's House" she dropped the speech and mannerisms of that character, which had marred her performance as Miss Priss in "The Importance of Being Earnest."
