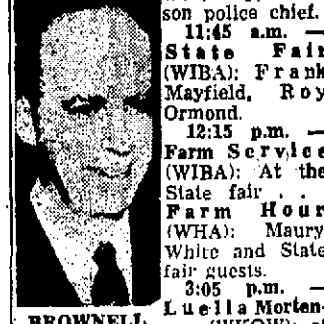

Picard and Son Dive Down 3,609 Feet in New Test

CASTELLAMARE DI STABIA, Italy (UP)—Prof. August Picard and his son, Jacques, in the first big test of their new bathysphere dived to a depth of 3,609 feet Wednesday in the Mediterranean, but all they saw was a six-inch phosphorescent fish.

The 69-year-old Swiss-born professor and his son sat back-to-back in the cramped pressure-proof cabin as they went to the bottom of the "Capri ditch" in the first major descent of the new bathysphere.

Forty-eight minutes after the sphere disappeared beneath the surface Picard reported by telephone to the accompanying Italian navy tug Tenace that he was down to 3,446 feet. Later aboard the tug he told newsmen his second instrument recorded a depth of 3,609 feet.

White Picard and his son were making trial dives in the Castellamare harbor recently a French navy crew, manning one of the professor's old bathyspheres, dived to a record depth of 6,890 feet off Toulon, France.

MILLS BROTHERS circus,

which will give performances at 2 and 8 p. m. Friday at Blooming Grove Park, is the only circus ever endorsed by a legislative resolution. And the legislature which adopted the resolution was Wisconsin's.

The circus reversed its route this year so that it could be in Wichita, Kans., next month for the national convention of the Circus Fairs Assn. (CFA). Wisconsin has a particular interest in this, too, for it ranks among the top ten states in CPA members. It has 82 of whom 18 live in Madison. Many are expected to attend the Wichita convention Sept. 19-21.

Usually the Mills show plays the Midwest early in the season. This year, however, it moved East from its winter quarters in Ohio, and now is well along on its Midwest tour.

In other years, Mills Brothers circus has visited Wisconsin in late June or early July. This season's Madison stop is scheduled for Monday in Milwaukee. Next came Fond du Lac and Appleton, and the circus will be in Beaver Dam today. From Madison it will go to Monroe and thence to Prairie du Chien.

Incidentally, the Mills show never plays on Sunday, so the Prairie du Chien engagement will be on Monday.

ODDEST JOB: Clement D. Jones,

United Press correspondent in Hollywood nominates for the most unusual job in film-land:

Orville Kesterson, whose task it is to silence a 36-piece orchestra so they can't sound a note during the musical sequences of "The Glenn Miller Story."

Kesterson, custodian of all musical instruments in Universal-International's prop department, has only silenced pieces in his collection. They're used only before the cameras, never during recording sessions.

He makes sure his instruments are kept quiet by stuffing the mouthpieces of brass instruments with cork, soaping the strings and bows of violins, cellos and basses, fiddles, taking the strings out of the pianos, removing the reeds from reed instruments and rubberizing the surfaces of percussion instruments.

This may come as news to some, but musical scenes in plaster city are usually all recorded on the sound track before being filmed on the set. What you see on the screen is a group of professional musicians hired to appear in front of the cameras. They go through the motions of playing while a recording accompaniment plays.

Knetzer, One-Time Famed New-Used Car Dealer, Dies

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP)—Robert L. Knetzer, fabulous former auto dealer and alleged master swindler, died of a heart attack Tuesday in Bozeman, Mont., the FBI reported Wednesday.

Richard N. Hestony, agent in charge of the FBI office here, said the news of Knetzer's death was received by teletype from the chief of police at Bozeman. Further details were not available here.

Knetzer became famous after World War II dealing in "new-used" autos in southwestern Illinois. He built up a booming multimillion-dollar business selling the hard-to-get autos.

His boom fell through in 1948 when too many customers demanded refunds of deposits placed with him. Since then, he had been in and out of the courts and jail.

Currently he had been free on bond pending appeal of his federal conviction on charges of concealing assets from the trustees of his bankrupt estate.

Air Force Mum on B-36 Flight

TOKYO (AP) The Far East Air Force dropped a cloak of secrecy over its Pacific-hopping B-36 bombers Wednesday, refusing flatly to say why they are here or how long they will stay.

Air Force spokesman said "no comment" to all queries. It still was not known how many of the huge intercontinental bombers arrived here Monday from the United States on the "routine training mission."

Unofficial speculation ran high, and observers wondered whether the B-36s were:

- ONE. To test their new capacity to launch F-84 jet fighter-bombers and retrieve them on the wing.
- TWO. On hand to add a Sunday punch air to the United Nations air arm should the war be renewed in Korea.
- THREE. Making a test run between the North American and Asiatic continents with dummy loads of atomic bombs.
