Bill Doudna's Spotlight

ARTHUR TOSCANINI will appear on the 17th season of the NBC Symphony orchestra on Saturday, Nov. 7. The concerts will originate in New York's Carnegie hall, Radio City will show the podium with Toscanini for the sixth successive season. Since Toscanini will leave one year during which he directed only several benefit concerts, this will be his 18th year as musical director of the orchestra formed especially for him in 1937.

Among the highlights Toscanini has planned for this season are a two-part concert performance of the opera "Un Ballo in Maschera" by Verdi, "Zoltan Kodaly's "Pannas Hungaricus," an all-Sibelius program, an all-Wagner program, Kabalevsky's "Cello Concerto," an all-Mendelssohn program, and Strauss' "Don Quixote." Cantelli has chosen music of contemporary and classical composers. Among the pieces programmed for his eight concerts are "Four Pieces" by Frescobaldi, "The Martyrdom of St. Sebastian" by Debussy, "Symphony No. 7" by Schubert, "Concerto for Strings and Brass" by Hindemith, "Song of the Nightingale" by Stravinsky, "La Valse" by Ravel, and "Aria della Battaglia" by Gabrielli.

Until the start of the 1953-54 season on Nov. 7 the NBC Summer Symphony concerts will continue. The broadcasts take place in Radio City with guest conductors. Scheduled as conductors for the remainder of the season are Samuel Antik, Sept. 20; Massimo Freccia, Sept. 26 and Oct. 3; Peter Herman Adler, Oct. 10 and 17, and Jonel Perlea, Oct. 24 and 31.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By Oswald Jacoby East's double of six spades is the highest point of today's hand. It illustrates the slam double as this is practiced by most of the leading experts today.

You don't double a slam just because you want to exact a higher penalty from your opponents. Such a double stands to gain only 50 or 100 points, since experienced opponents will hardly ever bid a slam that you can beat more than one trick.

It stands to lose about 200 to 600 points if the slam is actually made, depending on whether or not the declarer can afford to redouble.

Once in a while such a double loses a very large amount, since it helps declarer find the winning line of play when he would have played the hand normally and would have gone down if he had not been warned by the double.

The modern expert slam double says merely, "Partner, make an unusual opening lead and we will probably beat this slam." The idea of the slam double is not merely to gain 50 or 100 points; it is to defeat the slam rather than to allow it to be made.

The difference between making a slam and not making it is over 1000 points, and you don't mind exposing yourself to an occasional loss when you can score as big a gain as that.

In today's hand West had no trouble in deciding which lead his partner wanted. East could not want a diamond lead since he had had a chance to double five diamonds and had not done so. The choice was therefore between hearts and clubs.

It was conceivable that East had two fast club tricks, but if that happened to be the case there was some hope that East might get his club tricks later on even if some other suit were led to begin with.

West's length in hearts suggested that his partner wanted a heart ruff. If he had doubled the heart lead would do the trick. If West led anything else, declarer would naturally draw trumps promptly.

Acting on this reasoning, West led a heart, giving his partner a ruff. East then cashed the ace of clubs to defeat the contract.

South should have run to six no-trumps on this hand to avoid the ruff. In actual practice, few declarers run out to six no-trump when doubled at six of a suit. More often, they stand by their guns; and sometimes they even redouble.
