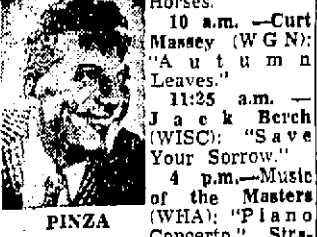

SBA Office Here to Accept Loan Requests
 (State Journal) — Washington Bureau WASHINGTON — The branch office of the Small Business Administration (SBA) located at Madison will be authorized to accept loan applications on September 29, William D. Mitchell, administrator, announced here Sunday.

Leading activities of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC) will cease on Sept. 28, Mitchell said, and the Small Business Administration will take over at that time.

Under a new policy the SBA will give preference to companies contributing military, defense and essential civilian requirements. If financial assistance is available through other sources, and on reasonable terms, the application will be denied.

Under the Small Business Act of 1953, authorization was extended to the administration to grant loans not exceeding \$150,000 to any one borrower. Out of the \$55,000,000 revolving fund for loans appropriated by Congress, a reserve of "several millions" has been set aside for disaster loans.

Knowland Visits Villages in India
 NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Sen. William F. Knowland, (R-Calif.), toured villages within a radius of 100 miles around New Delhi Sunday to study how American aid is used in Indian community projects.

The Senate majority leader meets tonight with Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru. Knowland will fly to Karachi, Pakistan, Tuesday.

New Radar Device Aids Carrier Pilots
 WALTHAM, Mass. (AP)—The Navy Sunday disclosed a new radar device to aid pilots landing high-speed jet fighters on the short, pitching decks of a carrier.

The equipment "locks" the speed of a plane approaching the deck, enabling the carrier to warn the pilot if he is coming in too fast or too slow.

The speed-measuring device was developed by the Raytheon Manufacturing Co. here, and has been installed on several carriers with a "gratifying" increase in safety, Navy spokesmen said.

Raytheon engineers described it as the first successful project to develop a complete, carrier-controlled system for guiding the approach and landing of planes.

Five Die as Rains Cause Italian Floods
 ROME (AP)—Torrential rains caused floods and landslides across Italy last night and early Sunday, killing five persons.

Four workers were killed at Limerza near Genoa when a landslide buried a hut where they had sought refuge from the rain.

A 17-year-old boy drowned in Tuscany when flood waters washed away a bridge over the flooded Maddalena river.

COMMONWEALTH TO MEET
 CANBERRA, Australia (AP)—Australia plans to be host to a British Commonwealth conference about the second week of January next year. Chancellor of the Exchequer R. A. Butler will represent Britain, government sources said.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

South deserved a better fate in today's hand. He saw through a deceptive play by West and made the best possible measure at every step. Unfortunately for South, however, West was equally alert and the breaks were in West's favor.

West opened the seven of spades, and declarer allowed East to hold the first trick with the jack. He won the spade return in dummy with the ace, naturally enough, and tried a diamond finesse.

West casually played a low diamond, hoping that his king would not be forced out until he had managed to establish his spades.

If South had been careless, he would have switched to clubs, losing a finesse to East. East would then lead his last spade, forcing out declarer's king. West would gain the lead with his king of diamonds in time to set the contract with his long spades.

South avoided this trap by leading a heart to dummy in order to try a second diamond finesse. West had to take his king of diamonds, and this meant the end of his ambition to bring in his long spade suit.

His only chance was to return a heart in the hope that his partner would have strong enough hearts to carry on a successful defense.

The heart return killed poor South. He could still have made his contract by cashing all of his high cards and then allowing East to take his hearts, which West would be forced to lead clubs up to the dummy. But South took the ace of hearts and tried a simple club finesse.

As it happened the club finesse lost, and East promptly cashed his two heart tricks. Even though South was set one by his actual line of play, I don't really blame him. I give credit to West for refusing the first diamond finesse. If West had taken this first trick, South would have had no trouble with his game contract.

Mitchell Claims Loyalty Oath Split Exaggerated

CHICAGO (AP)—Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell said Sunday the party's "loyalty oath" problems have been exaggerated beyond all proportion by persons who don't know what they are talking about.

Mitchell said conversations he had with Democratic leaders at their political conference here last week convinced him the party is making progress toward healing any North-South split over the loyalty issue.

The conference established an advisory committee to study the loyalty issue and report to the 1956 national convention.

Mitchell said he was certain party leaders would not have taken this action if they did not expect an agreement.

"I'm sure the principal property in the misused loyalty oath is to make sure the Democratic candidates are put on the ballot under the Democratic ticket in every state," he said.

The party attempted to do this with its 1952 loyalty oath, but some southern leaders rebelled at endorsing candidates whose civil rights views were too strong for them.

Asked if he thought the oath should be changed, Mitchell said there is "really not much difference about the substance of the loyalty oath as about the manner in which it has been discussed."

The national chairman appeared on a television show.

Ex-Albanian King to Leave Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Former King Zog of Albania will leave Egypt Oct. 18 because the Egyptian government withdrew recognition of the royal Albanian legation here, informed sources said Sunday.

The sources said the former king will go to Paris and then decide whether to live in France or go to the United States.

Zog, his wife, former Queen Geraldine, his son, Prince Leka, four sisters, and court officials sought refuge here in 1945 after the Communists took over Albania.
