Air Force Unveils New Super Sabre Jet
 PALMDALE, Calif. (AP)—The Air Force unveiled its supersonic combat jet fighter, the F-100 Super Sabre, Tuesday in an exhibition of the plane's ability to break through the sonic speed barrier that almost had observers diving to the ground.
 Test Pilot George Welch pulled the plane out of its dive at an altitude so low that one observer estimated it was 75 feet over this desert test center.
 The result, concussion shattered plate glass windows in the administration building here and scattered fragments for more than 20 feet. Welch himself did not estimate he was that low, saying he believed it was below 1,000 feet when he came out of the dive.

THE WORD "bewitching"
 once meant mainly "gaining power by charms or incantations," today it means attractive, or even beautiful. Gillian Holroyd, combined the definitions as the lovely modern witch of John Van Druten's comedy, "Bell Book and Candle." Emmy Bunks, a newcomer to Wisconsin Players, made her just that in the campus group's production which opened Tuesday night in the Wisconsin Union theater.

As light and happy as the same author's "The Voice of the Turtle," this play is equally light-hearted in its approach to extort marital love. Van Druten doesn't make it necessarily attractive; rather, he simply accepts it as an expedient in certain cases. Briefly, his approach is amoral rather than immoral. Basically, however, the result is neither, for out of the situation he develops unselfishness as the desirable quality. The whole cast was perfectly chosen.

Miss Bunks was a charming witch in both senses of the word. Charles Held, another newcomer, was the young publisher whom she won first with incantations, then with human love. A tea-drinking scene was an example of the capabilities of both in the art of comedy.

James Kentzler played the girl's brash young brother, whose own talents with potions and such caused much of the play's merriment. Gloria Link was the similarly endowed, if less wise, aunt of that pair.

Jerry McNeely gave a high-grade performance as a happy and amiable drunk. Beka, a cat belonging to Mrs. Alfred Reed, was a well-behaved messenger of Gillian.

Prof. John E. Dietrich's direction accentuated the highlights of the smartly-written comedy, and rightly played down the more obvious humor.

The single setting would have been more effective with more economy in its dressing.

Dates for Yule Gifts to GIs Abroad Given
 The postoffice announced Tuesday afternoon that Christmas packages for members of the Armed Forces serving overseas should be mailed before Nov. 15 for reasonable guarantee of delivery before Christmas day.

Air parcel post sent to personnel of the Armed Forces should be mailed not later than Nov. 25, the postoffice announcement cautioned.

Christmas cards sent overseas may be mailed at any time, but patrons should deposit such cards prepared at the first-class rate before Nov. 15 and at the air mail rate before Dec. 1, for reasonable expectation of delivery before Christmas.

Air parcel post is limited to 30 inches in length and girth combined and two pounds in weight. Domestic limits apply in other parcel post. Postal authorities warned that boxes for overseas transmission must be of strong construction—made of metal, wood, solid fibboard or strong double-faced corrugated fibboard testing at least 275 pounds.

Each box must be securely tied with strong cord. Domestic rates of postage apply. Addresses must be accurate and complete and in ink or by typewriter.

Packages destined for Japan, Korea, or the South Pacific should be mailed as early as possible, preferably by Nov. 1, the postoffice said.

Jerome "Jerry" Langer, 20-year-old University of Texas student, has signed a long-term acting contract with Columbia pictures. He'll complete his college degree requirements by correspondence.

James O'Hara and Macdonald Carey will co-star in "Five over Africa," to be filmed in London, Tangier, and Malaga.

Prof. John Wilde's "The Usurpers" is in the current exhibition of Contemporary American Painting at the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York City. Wilde is on the art education faculty of the University of Wisconsin.

OLD VIC: The Metropolitan Opera House will be the New York showcase for the Old Vic production of Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream." S. Hurok announced Tuesday. This will mark the first time in the 70-year history of the Metropolitan Opera House that a legitimate show will be performed on its stage.

The Old Vic production, which will have its world premiere at the Edinburgh Festival next summer, will open at the Metropolitan shortly after Labor Day, 1954. Motra Shearer and Robert Helpmann will play Titania and Oberon, respectively, with Stanley Holloway as Bottom.

The Metropolitan was chosen because it is one of the few theaters in the country with a stage large enough for the production. The company of 65 which will cross the ocean will include a corps de ballet which will perform dances to the incidental music of Felix Mendelssohn, to be played in its entirety by a symphony orchestra in the pit.

By the time the curtain rises for the premiere at the Metropolitan Opera, the entire troupe, including the orchestra, assembled here will number some 123 persons.

"South Pacific" is based primarily on two stories from James A. Michener's "Tales of the South Pacific"—"Our Heroine" and "Ft. Dilla"—but characters and incidents from other tales were woven into the story. Performances will be at 8:20 nightly, with matinees Wednesday and Saturday.
