Uncle Ray's Corner
Why Did He Attack?



In books of history we often find notes on the attacks made by Sir Francis Drake against the Spaniards in the New World, but we seldom see any word about the reasons for the attacks.

There is a mention of the general state of ill feeling between Spain and England, but that is only a part of the story. In addition, Drake was angered by a fight in a Mexican harbor which took place while he was a young sea captain. Here, in brief, is the account which Drake and his commander, Sir John Hawkins,

Drake was aboard one of the vessels which escaped, and Hawkins was on the other. From that time forward both of these men attacked Spanish vessels and settlements whenever possible. The first Queen Elizabeth was on the English throne at the time, and she was pleased when reports came to her about successful raids.

Drake was in command of three vessels. Drake sailed to Central America. He knew that the Spaniards were taking large amounts of gold, silver, and jewels from Peru. The treasures were placed on galleons which sailed northward to the little port of Panama. From there they were transported across the isthmus to the backs of mules. A mule train crossed the isthmus and reached

The Sunday Spotlight

Two phases of Indian art—painting and music—are represented on the University of Wisconsin campus by a single man, Sushil Kumar Mukherjee.

Besides being a painter and a flutist, Mukherjee is also a teacher of wide fame.

An exhibit of his paintings opened Friday in the main lounge of the Memorial Union, where it will be on display until Nov. 12. He usually works with egg tempera or oil, but sometimes uses water color.

As a musician, Mukherjee will be the featured artist in a concert, "Music of India," at 4 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 8, in Great Hall of the Memorial Union.

The program will be sponsored by the India assn. of the university.

It is the organization which we have thanked in the past for giving us the means of sharing in the culture of India.

Its past programs have been devoted largely to the dance, with music interludes giving us a taste of the country's music. Now, thanks again to these students from India, we shall hear more of it.

Mukherjee and his flute have been heard often on radio stations at Calcutta, Madras, and New Delhi, and he has played background music for India-produced motion pictures. Next Sunday, he will sing, too, and will perform on other instruments.

Gaurang Yodh, a student at the University of Chicago, will return to Madison to accompany Mukherjee on the tabla, or drums. He has played here in the past for dance recitals by Vashi and Veena in the Wisconsin Union theater. Yodh also will play a solo on the sitar, a stringed instrument.

Another assisting artist will be Shyamal Sinha, a graduate student in veterinary science at Wisconsin, who will play a stringed instrument called the sarod.

The principal musician is on the campus as a visiting educator sponsored by the U. S. state department under the Smith-Mundt exchange program.

Not satisfied with doing much in painting and music, Mukherjee has turned his attention to the stage, and has put his ideas about drama into productions at the Lawrence school in Loveland, India.

This school is reputed to have the finest art department and school art gallery in all India. Its pupils range from 10 to 21 years of age, and many of them have been shown in exhibitions in India.

Mukherjee's paintings first drew widespread attention at the Delhi Art exhibition, sponsored by the department of the government of India. They have also been shown at the Paris International

exhibition sponsored by UNESCO, and the Kabuli Exhibition of Contemporary India Painters.

"In color scheme," says an announcement from the Wisconsin Union gallery committee, "the artist stresses heavy tones but not light and shade effects. Vitality of form and expression of thought and sentiment are shown by works that are abstract, nearly geometrical, or have long sweeps of bright color."

"His home, Bengal, which is noted for painters, and his teacher, Devi Prasad Roy Choudhury, influenced his early works, but his paintings also resemble those of Van Gogh and Picasso."

the coast of the Caribbean Sea, on a Sunday morning, Drake and the riches were placed aboard other galleons and were carried to Spain.

Arming 50 of his sailors, Drake led them inland. The Englishmen were joined by a band of 70 Frenchmen, and together they surprised a mule train loaded with gold and jewels. The English and the French divided the booty equally.

The event came to be described as "Drake's raid on the Spanish main." People of that time spoke of that part of the New World as the "Spanish main" to set it apart from Spanish islands, reaching Plymouth, England,

his men produced much excitement. Several sailors went ashore and told what had happened. The news spread rapidly. We are told that it reached a church while the minister was preaching a sermon, and that almost everyone in the church jumped from his seat and ran to the harbor.

This voyage, and several others, raised Drake high in the favor of Queen Elizabeth. Most famed of his journeys was the one which took him around the world. On his return from the world voyage Elizabeth gave him the honor of knighthood, dubbing him "Sir Francis Drake."
