## Government Costs \$646 Per Person

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal state and local governments spent a total of \$101,500,000,000 in the 12 months ending June 30, 1952—\$646 for every man, woman and child in America.  
 The Census Bureau said more than half went for defense or defense-linked federal activities. Education got the next largest bit but only about one-sixth as much as defense. After that, in order, came highways, health and hospitals, public welfare, postal service and police and fire protection.

## Forester Leaves for Briefing on Duties in Africa

Eugene W. Fobes, 2714 Coolidge ave., forester at the U. S. Forest Products Laboratory, left Madison Sunday for a 6-week briefing in Washington before he leaves for Liberia, West Africa.  
 Fobes expects to stay in Liberia for two years as forestry adviser for the foreign agricultural service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. He will help the Negro republic with forest conservation and marketing problems.  
 Mrs. Fobes and the couple's children, Bill, 17, Mary, 11, and Jack, 8, will join Fobes in Washington for the trip to Liberia. The family will live in Sinkor, a suburb of Monrovia, which has a population of 25,000 and is one of Liberia's largest communities.  
 Fobes, who has been in the U. S. forest service for 21 years as ranger and researcher, said that Liberia, a well-forested country, covers about 43,000 square miles—roughly two-thirds the size of Wisconsin—and has 350 miles of coastline.  
 The commercial value of Liberia's forests is largely unknown. Some valuable trees grow there, including khaya (African mahogany), iroko, obohe, sapelle and glack guarea. Most of the woods are unknown on foreign markets and little timber is exported.

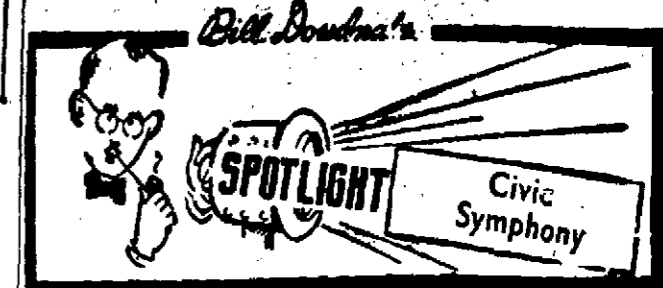

## Henri Aubert, Young Parisian Violinist, Received an ovation Sunday night at the opening concert of the Madison Civic Music Assn.'s 28th season.

After his scintillating performance of Lalo's "Symphonie Espagnole" with the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra, the audience called him back for several bows, and, finally, an encore.  
 Appropriately, the orchestra began its concert with Beethoven's "Consecration of the House" overture, for this was the first program in the remodeled auditorium of Central high school, now the organization's permanent house. In effect, it was a homecoming, for the orchestra had its beginnings in the same hall.

## Aubert played the Lalo work with authority and a rich sense of melody, a necessity for this tune-packed score.

In flights of virtuosity and in sensuous melodic lines, Aubert was equally good, and the orchestra under Walter Heermann gave him effective support, especially in its sharply-timed echoes. The encore was the first movement of Bach's G-minor partita sonata, played eloquently.  
 Neither a symphony, as the title suggests, nor a true concerto, the "Symphonie Espagnole" is more of a suite for violin and orchestra, with contrasting periods of gracefulness and broadly-splashed color.

## JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By Oswald Jacoby

Some plays are so simple that you don't really notice them. When today's hand was played, the declarer and the dummy had a long discussion about the proper complicated way to make the contract (after South had managed to go down), but neither of them spotted the very easy sure-fire line of play.

West opened the seven of clubs, and dummy won with the ace.

Declarer cashed dummy's top diamonds, discarding a heart from his hand, and ruffed a low diamond with the five of spades. West cleverly discarded a heart instead of overruffing.

South worried for a minute or so about his next play and then decided to try for a crossruff. He cashed the ace of hearts and led a low heart towards dummy. West ruffed and returned a trump, whereupon the whole hand collapsed. The diamonds couldn't be brought in, the crossruff wouldn't work, and South was able to win only ten tricks.

North tried to prove that South should have discarded a club rather than a heart on the second high diamond. Then he would eventually be able to keep a heart entry to dummy and bring in the diamond suit.

"How does that work out?" South wanted to know. And North explained that the play goes in the same way as usual. West ruffs the second heart and returns a trump. The South would win in a dummy with the

heart (their best defense). South takes the heart ace, leads the low trump to dummy's queen, ruffs a low diamond, and then draws all of the trumps. The king of hearts is the entry to the established diamonds.

South need only give the opponents an early diamond trick, and he then has no further problems. The slam is then safe as long as neither opponent has five trumps or five diamonds.
