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JACOBY ON BRIDGE

When the Ontario Championships begin today in Toronto, "Shorty" Sheardown will be doing his best to keep all the championships in Canada.

A large contingent of experts from the United States will try especially hard to take the titles. This would be only a mild revenge for the time that Shorty and his teammates won the American national team title right from under the noses of fifty or sixty American teams.

In today's hand, played in a rubber bridge game in Toronto, Sheardown had to execute one of the rarest plays in bridge to make his game contract. It looks like an optical illusion at first, but the "smother" play really works.

East won the first two heart tricks and continued the suit, forcing Sheardown to make his first decision. He decided against discarding a club, since East might have only two clubs headed by the king, in which case declarer could afford to lose a trump trick. After some thought, Sheardown ruffed the third heart with the king of spades, and West discarded a low club.

Declarer next led the jack of spades, and let it ride for a finesse. Business looked good when the finesse succeeded, and Sheardown led the 10 of spades to repeat the finesse. East's heart discard was very discouraging.

Washington to Hold Air Raid Test Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — With President Eisenhower leading in the way, some 350,000 adults and children in the nation's capital will take part in an air raid drill today.

Federal buildings from the White House on down, as well as public and parochial schools, will be emptied.

Traffic will not be halted and pedestrians will not be asked to take shelter.
