JACOBY ON BRIDGE

When the Winter National Championships begin in Dallas, Mrs. Edith Kemp is sure to defend the open team title that she helped win last year.

One of the reasons Mrs. Kemp wins so many tournament events is that she takes the trouble to ask herself why her opponents play or bid as they do. The result of this type of question is shown in today's hand.

West opened the queen of spades. This imaginative lead was made at several tables, where West hoped to "find" his partner's long suit.

At some tables, West regained the lead quickly when declarer took a finesse for the queen of clubs. The ace of spades and a spade continuation then produced four top tricks, setting the contract.

When Mrs. Kemp won the first trick with the king of spades she thought to herself: "Hmm, he must have honors in every suit."

The success of this play confirmed her impression about the nature of West's hand. She decided to cash another top club, scoring the finesse. This dropped West's queen, and now declarer had four club tricks.

West had such obvious trouble in finding discards on the clubs that Mrs. Kemp decided that it was quite safe to take the diamond finesse too.

This added insult to injury, since making 10 tricks was enough for top. The eleventh trick was just an example of perfectionism.

There were Tschakowsky-like sweeps in the orchestra during the second movement, interesting conversations between the cello and the woodwinds in the first, and a dynamic, dancing scherzo to finish.

The opening number, the overture to "Don Giovanni," revealed the orchestra in great shape for the program.

Woodwinds always have been topnotch in Church's orchestras, and this time, in both the overture and the Tschakowsky fourth symphony, the other sections were equally good. The horn department was especially fine—I have never heard a student orchestra with one like it.

The orchestra was noteworthy for its buildups to giant climaxes in the symphony, with the violins performing gallantly. And there were some striking solo passages from bassoon, flute, oboe, clarinet, and horn.

Trieste Proposals by Italy Receive a Cold Shoulder

BELGRADE (AP)—Yugoslav officials said Sunday Italy's weekend proposal to take up the Trieste crisis at a five-power conference was "completely unacceptable" if any prior conditions were attached.

Premier Giuseppe Pella of Italy was reported in London to have accepted a Big Three invitation to a conference with the United States, Britain, France, and Yugoslavia.

Italian officials gave no indication of what conditions, if any, Pella set for the conference. Officials said the Foreign Office here had not yet received from the American, British, and French envoys the details of the Italian proposal.

The officials were wary of comment pending the receipt and study of the formal version of the move.
