'La Traviata'

TIP O' THE MORNING: Virginia Mayo's first picture since the birth of her daughter, Mary Catherine, will be "The Talkman," in which she will co-star with George Sanders and Rex Harrison.

Opera regained much of its stature for Madison audiences Monday night when the New York City Opera Co. opened a two-day engagement with Verdi's "La Traviata." This production was well staged and ably conducted, with a group of leading artists who could sing. Such a combination has been rare around here, in the field of grand opera, for a long, long time.

Thomas P. Martin conducted the performance with vitality and intelligence, the same qualities he displayed two years ago when he conducted "Die Fledermaus" in the same theater. He kept the orchestra well in hand, with few exceptions, and the production as a whole moving smoothly.

Eva Likovna was Violetta, charming enough to win a lover and credible in her illness and death. Possessing a powerful voice, she could give it a lyric quality (which she did, for instance, in her renunciation of her sweetheart) as well as fill the theater.

Cornell MacNeil made the individual hit of the evening as the elder Germont, father of Violetta's lover. His "Di Provenza," one of the opera's most popular arias, brought deservedly enthusiastic response. One could wish, however, that the applause might be held until the orchestra's phrases were finished.

MacNeil restrained in his delivery, giving the flavor of one's own rather than anger when he met Violetta and when he upbraided his son, near the end of the opera, for his treatment of her.

Jon Crain sang Alfredo Germont with a voice which often was beautiful but which (no often was forced. This strain showed in the quieter passages of his music, putting a trace of harshness on it.

Others in the cast had so little to do that one could hardly judge them. Mary Krete as the maid, Annina, indicated ability that went beyond the merely adequate.

The most striking thing about this "La Traviata," in contrast with its recent predecessors, was its stage direction, which had the singers moving like people instead of puppets, both singly and in groups. There was little tendency to overact—in fact, more emotion at some points would have been helpful.

Costuming was glamorous and colorful, but the settings were unimaginative and shabby.

Glenn Tuley and Felisa Conde danced a comic matador sequence in a ballroom scene. It was good, but seemed out of place in this tragic tale.

TONIGHT: The opera company will do Mozart's "The Marriage of Figaro" in the same theater at 8 tonight, with a different cast and a new conductor.

CHRISTMAS: The Tudor Singers will present their annual Christmas dinner concert at 8 p. m. Sunday, Dec. 13, and Monday, Dec. 14, in Tripp Commons. Tickets will be sold Nov. 30 to Dec. 5 to Wisconsin Union members and Dec. 7 to 13 to others.

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Old East Berliners Risk Red Anger to Get U. S. Butter

BERLIN (AP)—Thousands of aged East Berliners risked Communist anger Monday to cross into West Berlin and pick up American-donated butter.

Some reported later that their gifts were taken away by East German police in the Soviet sector.

It was the first day of the butter give-away to East Berliners over 60 years of age, and 17,300 pounds were handed out.

Officials said the initial distribution went off smoothly in contrast to the rioting last summer when the Communists tried to break up the handing out of American food parcels.

At least 20 East Berliners came back for butter a second time. They reported that East German police checked the butter parcels, confiscated the butter, and took down their names.

A total of 236,000 pounds of butter will be given East Berliners in the next two weeks in the second phase of a program to provide a million pounds to aged Germans in all sectors.

Since Oct. 24, about 434,000 pounds have been given residents of the Allied sectors.

U. S. Carrier Boxer Due Back from Korea

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—The U. S. aircraft carrier Boxer, last major warship on the combat line in Korean waters before the truce, was listed Monday as due here Wednesday from the Far East.

Many of the 2,000 men aboard will be able to reach their homes for Thanksgiving.

The Boxer, which left this home port eight months ago, is returning from its fourth Korea combat cruise.

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Arabia Will Remain Friendly with West, New King Promises

CAIRO (UP)—Oil rich Saudi Arabia's friendship with the West and welcome to foreign oil companies were pledged anew Monday by King Saud bin Abdul Aziz.

The new sovereign said he would carry on the policy of his father, King Ibn Saud, who died Nov. 8, and never would tolerate Communist or any other propaganda in his desert kingdom.

The king made his first statement to the press on international policy in a long distance interview.

Crown Prince Feisal, the king's brother and foreign minister, relayed the questions to the king and his answers to Cairo.

"The policy which his majesty wishes to pursue toward the United States and the Western world is the same as that which his great late father pursued, namely, to be friendly toward friendly countries and improve relations with all Western countries in accordance with the United Nations charter by which our country is bound," the king said.

Asked about Saudi Arabia's attitude toward foreign oil companies, the king's reply was:

"The attitude of Saudi Arabia toward foreign oil companies is that of a righteous partner. We shall obtain from them our complete rights, and give them their full dues. Moreover, we shall extend our protection to them, and give them all legitimate facilities and assistance."
