# Uncle Ray's Corner

## Automobile Is 183 Years Old

We think of the gasoline automobile as a feature of the 20th century, and so it is. It was invented during the latter part of the past (or 19th) century, and it became popular only during the present century. Very few motor cars were to be seen on the roads 55 years ago.  
 Despite those facts, the story of the steam automobile goes back to the lifetime of Franklin. If good old Ben had a door Richard, as some call him, had visited France several years earlier than he did, he might have seen a strange sight on a Paris street. A three-wheeled truck was built and tested by a clever Frenchman 183 years ago. The inventor was Nicholas Cugnot (pronounced coon-Yoh).  
 Used Steam Engine  
 The power which Cugnot used was a steam engine. The engine was a crude affair (made before the great work of James Watt was done) but it worked. It caused the lumbering truck to move half a mile in 12 minutes. A man could walk faster than that, but the speed was hardly important. The mighty fact was this: A wheeled vehicle had been made to move by means of an engine!  
 The 44-year-old French inventor seems to have been the first man in history to make a machine which could be described as an automobile. His clumsy truck would seldom move more than a third of a mile before the steam power gave out. Then the inventor, or one of his helpers, would pour more fuel in the fire box, producing more steam, and the truck would move again. We are told that Cugnot's last trip came to a sudden end when the truck ran into a stone wall and broke down.  
 Progress Made  
 Other men worked on the idea of steam-driven automobiles, especially Englishmen and Americans. In Philadelphia, 16 years after Cugnot first proved his point, Oliver Evans transported a small steambot from his workshop to the bank of a river by starting the engine and the moving a four-wheeled vehicle.  
 Several men in England worked on the idea of an automobile, and they won success after success. Trevithick, Gordon and Gurney were among the pioneers of the steam motor car in England.  
 Some of the early steam automobiles in England were made to pull carriages. The duke of Wellington was one of the passengers pulled overland by this means.

## Unseasonable Cold Expected for State During January

The U. S. Weather Bureau in Washington Wednesday predicted that January will be unseasonably cold in the Central Mississippi valley, including Wisconsin.  
 The bureau's long range forecasters issued the following outlook for the next 30 days.  
 "Temperatures will average below seasonal normals over most of the nation except for above normal over the northwest and in New England.  
 "The most unseasonable coldness is indicated in the west Gulf states and in the Central Mississippi valley.  
 "Precipitation is expected to exceed normal in the Gulf states and in areas east of the Appalachians, much of it in the form of snow north of Virginia.  
 "Sub-normal amounts are indicated west of the Continental divide and in the Central Plains and near normal amounts in areas not specified."  
 The Texas Field weather bureau said the outlook indicated near-normal precipitation was expected for Wisconsin in January.  
 (If the outlook is accurate, area residents can expect around 9 to 10 inches of snow, normal for Madison in January, according to past records.)
