NORWICH, Conn. (U.P.)—A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce's board of directors to consider the parking problem had to be postponed because of lack of a quorum. The directors could not find a place to park.

New Italian Cabinet Formed

ROME (U.P.)—Christian Democrat Amintore Fanfani formed a new Italian government Monday, which will assure Italy's continued support of Western policies.

The premier presented his cabinet to President Luigi Einaudi at Quirinale Palace. The new government lineup was very similar to the cabinet of Premier Giuseppe Pella which resigned Jan. 5.

Fanfani will go before the Assembly in today. It must be confirmed by the Italian Parliament before it has the power to rule.

Fanfani will go before the Assembly Jan. 26 to present his government's program and ask Parliament to vote its confidence in his cabinet and policies.

If the Chamber of Deputies fails to vote him its support, Fanfani will not bother to seek Senate backing. He will be out, and Einaudi must designate another premier.

High Court Limits States' Film Censors

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The Supreme Court ruled unanimously Monday that state censorship boards may not ban a movie on grounds it is "immoral" or tends to promote crime.

The ruling was in the form of a brief order. There was no written opinion.

The court merely cited its decision in "The Miracle" case in 1952 when it held that films may not be banned on grounds of sacrilege.

The basic reasoning of the 1952 opinion was that films should enjoy the "free speech" guarantee in the Constitution just as do newspapers and other means of communication.

A. and P. Hikes Coffee Prices in N. Y. Area

NEW YORK (AP)—A price boost of 3 cents, raising national coffee brands from \$1 a pound in \$1.03 a pound was put into effect by the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Co. Monday in the New York City and suburban area.

Safeway Stores said it would follow suit Tuesday.

The price boost affects such brands as Chase and Sanborn, Maxwell House, Beechnut, and Savarin but does not affect the various bag coffee brands of the two chains. The prices of the latter were raised two weeks ago.

French Tax Collectors Give Up Hopeless Task

CAMBRAI, France (U.P.)—The Finance Ministry Monday gave up dunning Michel Courtin for 3,000 francs (\$8.50) in back taxes.

It finally got the fact in its records that he was executed for murder two years ago.
