## 'Caine' Dazzles New York

### --'An Anchor Tank Town'

NEW YORK (AP)—Broadway tradition got a jolt this week from a young Midwesterner who makes a habit of disrupting established stage craft.

It is Paul Gregory, onetime Des Moines fugitive, who has become Hollywood acting choreographer and producer of "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial."

The pair have used only their own funds in their shows to date. Right now they are planning ahead into 1957.

Among projects lined up are a musical show starring Margie and Cover Champion, a dramatization of Thomas Wolfe's "The Web and the Rock," a Quaker-set musical "Eliza" for Mary Martin, a play about the fabulous career of art dealer Duveen, the biggest minstrel show anyone has ever seen, and, for next summer, their first motion picture.

Giving the road an all-out preview, with "New York a sort of anchor tank town, is a variation on the orthodox. That's particularly so nowadays when most impresarios are crying the blues over the decline of road business.

"The road is only as dead as the people sending the shows out," says Gregory.

"I haven't any idea what the public wants, but I know what I can sell them," Gregory says.

Never Frauded

The biggest ingredient in that salesmanship, he quickly adds, is: "We have never frauded. We have never promised — like the movies and sometimes the theater — things and actors that we didn't deliver."

"That lack of integrity in some of the entertainment business is what has hurt it most in the past 25 years."

Gregory's success story got its start when his path crossed that of British-born actor Charles Laughton six years ago. They've been a team ever since.

While working for one of the big theatrical agencies, "Gregory and Laughton gave a reading from literature, gave chase, and convinced the star that he should undertake a cross-country reading tour.

Laughton Unusual Idea

The alliance burgeoned from that first success. Then the two — the youth of 30 and the star of 50 — launched an "unorthodox" project, presenting "Don Juan in Hell" as a sort of composite reading with Laughton, Charles Laughton, Sir Cedric Hardwicke and Agnes Moorehead, which appeared in Madison.

"Don Juan's" author, George Bernard Shaw himself on a backward the episode could never be successfully staged.

"They thought I was just a show business freak when 'Don Juan' was such a success," Gregory reminisces. "Laughton and I have laughed over it many times."

## AFL Urges Action Against 'Recession'

MIAMI BEACH (AP)—The executive council of the AFL urged Monday the immediate allotment of funds for public works to combat a "recession" and "rapidly growing unemployment problem."

Reporting that unemployment increased in the last three months of 1953 from 1,200,000 to 2,350,000, the council said in a statement:

"If the recession is allowed to run to greater depths... gravest repercussions throughout the free world will be inevitable."

The unemployment situation means "serious trouble" unless there is immediate action by the government, the statement added.

The council said funds should be made available immediately for public works.

"This is no time for study," AFL President George Meany said. "This is the time for action. Unemployment feeds on unemployment by removing full consumers from the market."

## Blackmail Made Him Sign '45 Letter, James Roosevelt Says

LOS ANGELES (AP)—James Roosevelt Monday declared his wife's accusations of adultery with 12 women are false and that he was "blackmailed" into signing a letter confessing infidelity with nine of them.

He signed the letter, knowing it to be false, in overwhelming horror of adding to his late father's burden as President, he declared.

The letter, he said, was his wife's price for calling off a divorce action.

Arthur S. Schifferman, one of three attorneys representing Mrs. Roosevelt, said his client would have no statement, "until we have seen the statement, read it, digested it and conferred on it."

Roosevelt, an announced candidate for Congress in the 28th district, has been asked to withdraw as a result of the scandal. He said he will decide whether to file his formal declaration some time before the Apr. 2 deadline.

"My wife has chosen to make the most ugly accusation which it is possible to make against any man," the late Franklin D. Roosevelt's eldest son said, reading a statement to reporters at a press conference.

"Each and every allegation of misconduct by me is completely false and without foundation."

He expressed "an especial apology" to the nine women named in a 1945 letter signed by him and filed with the separate maintenance suit of his wife, Mrs. Romelle Schneider Roosevelt, last Thursday.

Roosevelt said his actions "were done under compulsion and in an effort to protect them."

He accused his wife of an "insatiable demand for material security" and said:

"From the very beginning there developed an unreasonable fear and jealousy of anybody with whom I had contact in a normal social way.

"There began a calculated campaign to transfer to her every material asset that I owned and a constant threat to accuse me of imaginary infidelities... This pattern reached its climax in the early part of 1945 when I was repeatedly faced with the demand that I acknowledge these imaginary happenings, and, as she put it, 'purge my soul.'

"I was given an alternative. She stated that if I once did this she would forever cease these demands and begin our marital life anew. If I did not, she would proceed with a divorce naming all individuals.

"At this time I was entering the fifth year of my active service in the Marine Corps, much of it overseas.

"Unfortunately, due to prior physical disabilities accentuated by malaria contracted in the South Pacific, I was very much below par physically.

"I further was actually conscious of the tremendous burden which my father was then carrying as President of the United States, and the horror of adding another to these burdens seemed to me to be overwhelming.

"It was promised that if I would sign a letter that attorneys would prepare, it would never be made public and that in time it would be destroyed."

Roosevelt said he had fully accepted his wife's statement that all such documents had been destroyed.

"That it was blackmail I now recognize, but my desire to keep these innocent people from a justified attack while I was overseas and unable to defend myself, my desire to make, if possible, a success of my marriage, and my desire to prevent any anguish to my own family led me to believe in the sincerity of my wife's statement.

"Therefore I yielded and signed it, together with her drastic financial demands, both at the same time, on the day before I left again for overseas duty on the 28th of February, 1945, the attached Marine Corps orders will show."

Roosevelt said that on his return from service, he made every conscientious effort to achieve successful marriage and believed his wife was convinced her charges imaginative when they proceeded to have three children.

"The imagined financial insecurity which I have mentioned and the various psychological matters involved in the marriage so affected my life she has made living together almost impossible."

Roosevelt said that threats of divorce or suicide were almost a daily occurrence and "in order to save the family and protect the children I have done everything I could, including responding to her demands that I turn over to her control of almost all that I have both in community property and property I owned before my marriage."

He denied his wife's allegation that his net worth is about \$2,000,000 or that his income could in any way justify the support demands which she has made.
