Something New on Radio

By WILLIAM L. DOWD (State Journal Radio Editor) Two new programs will be on WIBA and WHA-FM tonight, and I shall have the privilege of being the first guest on one of them.

The second new show will be "My Favorite Music." It will follow "Ask Madison," starting at 10:30. On this one, the idea is to bring to the microphone Madison people who are well known and have them introduce the music they like best.

In the past, WIBA engineers and announcers made the rounds of the guests' offices and recorded their answers to some questions of civic interest, and these will be broadcast tonight.

Fredrick Buerki, for example, is technical director of the Wisconsin Union theater. As a director of plays, he must select much background and intermission music. And he is a lover of musical shows; on his trips to New York, he always catches several, and he fre-

quently attends the St. Louis summer operas. Robert Zimmerman is assistant secretary of state. He is one of Madison's most ardent circus fans—so you can make a guess about what you'll hear on his program.

Another note about radio: A second set of stations—WHA and WHA-FM—will do a binaural broadcast at 9:30 a. m. today. This will be their first. It will use "Cathedral Echoes" to give the auditorium effect which listeners have praised on the two programs of the Madison City Symphony orchestra carried binaurally by WIBA and WHA-FM.

Two campus programs will be on the air today. At 4:15 p. m., WIBA and WHA-FM will broadcast the Sunday Music Hour and at 8 p. m. WHA-FM will offer Leo Steffens' piano recital in Music Hall. Both, of course, will be on the state FM network.

Incidentally, a reminder—the Steffens program replaces another originally scheduled for tonight. That one by Ernest and Marie Friedlander, will be given instead on March 28.

A record recommendation: Rudolf Serkin's performance of Beethoven's third piano concerto with the Philadelphia orchestra. Eugene Ormandy conducts the workmanlike, if not flashy, recording. It's a Columbia LP.
