### Bill Doubrava's SPOTLIGHT

String Sinfonia

**TIP OF THE MORNING:** Emmett Kelly will be in Paramount's "The Big Top" with Martin and Lewis, Joanne Drew, Zsa Zsa Gabor and the equipment—but not the name and title of the personnel—of the Clyde Beatty circus.

**BEAUTY WAS THE** watchword of the music which the Madison String Sinfonia had chosen to play at its concert in Scanlan hall Sunday. There was the majestic beauty of Handel, the noble of Bach, the luxurious of Tschalkowsky, and the compact of Olive Endres.

Miss Endres is a sister of Marie Endres, founder and conductor of the string orchestra, and her "Little Prelude and Fugue in G Minor" was written for the Sinfonia. The prelude was a handsome, sturdy piece, the fugue a sample of well-directed movement, all wisely orchestrated.

Added to the regular program was a fresh Endres composition, "Chorale for Three Cellos," pleasant to listen to but leaving a feeling of uncertainty. Further hearing may correct this for the listener.

**STAR PORTRAYS STAR:** An actor should have no trouble portraying an actor in a motion picture. He's just the type.

In practice, though, playing an actor is a difficult assignment.

James Mason, who is portraying a screen hero in "A Star is Born," is always afraid he's getting too much of himself into the part and not enough of what the author wrote.

He is so close to the character he can't size it up objectively, as he would the part of a doctor, or a policeman, for instance.

Mason says the role of film star Norman Maine opposite Judy Garland in "A Star is Born" is one of his most challenging.

"I have to keep remembering that Norman Maine isn't James Mason," says the actor.

"In any other role you keep in mind that you are somebody else, but in this case Norman Maine is a screen actor like I am."

"But actors have fun in portraying actors," continues Mason, "because it gives them a chance to mimic their colleagues, humorously, subtly, or devastatingly. They can show the talents and the foibles associated with members of our profession."

"And an actor enjoys knowing that, besides the regular audience, the regular audience of critical eyes just as lawyers, bus conductors, or reporters like to watch members of their calling portrayed on the screen."

"There is always lots of guessing over which screen or stage personality an actor is mimicking in his role."

"All the guesses about Norman Maine will be incorrect because he is a composite of many well-known stars, but in total is unlike any of them."

Jack Carson is discussing deals with CBS and NBC. The former wants him for radio, the latter for television.

Al Helfer's contract with Mutual network has been extended. Scott Brady will star in "The Law vs. Billy the Kid" at Columbia Pictures.

### Philippines Bases Bolster U.S. in Asia

MANILA (AP)—Mushrooming bases in the Philippines are bolstering the United States' defense pattern against Communism in Asia.

Not only are American air and naval facilities growing in this southern anchor of the Western Pacific defense chain, but a strategic supply center is being developed for nations battling Red aggression.

There have been four major developments:

ONE. An American airlift has been established from the Philippines to embattled French and Vietnamese forces in Indo-China. The flights have included U.S. technical personnel and equipment.

TWO. A mountain is being shoved into the China Sea for construction of a huge U.S. naval air base at Cubi Point, on western Luzon.

THREE. U.S. naval facilities on Subic Bay—adjoining the Cubi Point project—are being expanded to service and repair larger numbers of warships.

FOUR. The United States and the Philippines are negotiating for a revision of their bases agreement. This is expected to result in more improved bases in the islands.

Development of a sprawling naval air station at Cubi Point has been quietly in progress since October, 1951. Only recently did the Navy disclose that:

More than 3,000 Seabees have been working 24 hours a day in mauling a mountain here into the sea—moving 23 million cubic yards of earth for runways, taxi strips, and foundations for buildings.

A deep anchorage has been dredged for aircraft carriers. When construction is completed, perhaps this year, the Subic Bay area will accommodate a task force.
