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City Planning Exhibit Set at Library

The story of city planning will be told in an exhibit to be installed next week in the Madison Free library.

The exhibition, called "The Art of City Building, from the Theoretical to the Practical," will be sponsored by the Madison Art Association and the Madison Art Division of the American Institute of Architects.

After its formal start Tuesday night, it will be open to the public during library hours through Mar. 31.

The exhibit will include two large relief models of Madison and Maple Bluff, plus photographs and drawings of building projects proposed or recently constructed in the Madison area.

The history and theoretical approach to city planning will be shown in material collected and arranged by William V. Kaeser, 3407 Circle Close, architect.

Walter K. Johnson, 4217 Hiawatha dr., city plan engineer, has arranged material on city planning in four categories:

Surveys and research on planning for the Madison area; finance and budgeting; general city plans; proposed projects.

Working with Johnson were Kaeser and Carl Gausewitz, 4933 Tonywatha tr., architect.

Audubon Film to Be Shown Here

Motion pictures made on a 50,000 mile trip by a Michigan couple will be shown at 8 tonight at West high school auditorium.

The program will be the fourth of the season's "Audubon Screen Tours," sponsored by the Madison Audubon society.

The movies were made by Tom and Arlene Hadley, Holly, Mich., who will lecture on their trip. The film, "America the Beautiful," also will be accompanied by tape recordings of bird songs, wild animal calls, and other outdoor sounds, made on the same trip.

The scenes range from the Canadian Rockies to Key West, Fla., from Minnesota to Louisiana, and points between.

ONE VERSION of the last days of Jesse James was told effectively in Scanlan hall Wednesday night by the Madison Theater Guild. The play, "Missouri Legend," was the organization's second production in arena style, in which the audience surrounds the unraised acting area.

Admirable planning of the players' movements and efficient use of lights and sound made the story spin out smoothly. For this, credit goes to Director Al Barraclough and his crew. Although at times the action dragged a bit, the overall result was good, for the total playing time seemed less than it really was.

Acting honors went to Alvin J. Lee Jr., as the handsome, scholarly bandit; Maurice O'Hara, as his ballad-making companion from the Ozarks, Billy Gashade; David Starkweather, as the timorous turncoat of the James gang, and Marjorie Schaffer, as the pathetic widow Weeks.

Let's strength lay in his ability to project the sudden shifts in James' attitudes, from hard-praying Baptist to hard-riding bandit, a man who would not tolerate whiskey-drinkers nor women-chasers but who saw nothing wrong in his own depredations.

Miss Schaffer, as the widow, provided some of the play's fun, but made one sympathize with the woman whose farm was saved by James, a man she had been taught to hate. Incidentally, James lost nothing in the transaction; he simply robbed the deputy sheriff after the money had been collected.

Patricia King was a sympathetic Mrs. James, posing with her husband as a respectable neighbor, fearing less his exposure than his death. Others deserving special mention were Jack Davis, as Jesse's taciturn brother, and Erdman H. Pankow and Richard Kraus, as other gang members.

The production will be repeated at 8:15 tonight through Sunday and at 8:15 p. m. Wednesday through Saturday, March 17-20. All seats have been sold for the March 12 and 13 performances, but tickets are still available for the others.

The seating arrangement has been improved over last season's setup.
