If it weren't for the truth of the story, you could well believe that one of new RCA Victor's new recordings was an April 1 joke. It is called "A Florence Foster Jenkins!!! Recital!!!!!" A review is impossible. One can tell the story best simply by quoting the company's publicity: "The reputation of Florence Foster Jenkins hasn't dimmed in the decade that has passed since she took the stage at Carnegie hall and put on display the world's most unique soprano voice. "One of the musical legends that has grown with time, her story is unparalleled in the concert world. For years Mme. Jenkins' annual recital at the Ritz-Carlton was a private ceremony for the select few. The fame of this unusual musical experience mushroomed during the 10 years of its existence until finally, in an overpowering climax of her concertizing career, the diva gave a packed Carnegie hall recital at which 2,000 were turned away. "Part of the appeal of Mme. Jenkins' interpretations of famous arias was her disregard of convention and artistic discipline. The shrieks of grief and shouts of laughter which greeted her appearance in elaborate costumes appropriate for the moods of her songs, which often included wings and tinsel, and tulle, she received as an accolade to her appeal. "Mrs. Jenkins concluded that the demonstrations were similar tributes to those being given in the same era to Frank Sinatra. "To those thousands unable to gain admittance to her concerts, to those who have searched in vain the 10 years since her death for her few recordings and to the many to whom she is an incredible legend, RCA Victor Jenkins now offers a Florence Foster Jenkins recital on one 10-inch LP recording."

N.Y. Loses, Connecticut Gains 8 Thomas Hart Benton Murals

NEW YORK—Eight large murals of American life painted by Thomas Hart Benton for the Whitney Museum of American Art in 1932, but never placed on full exhibition, have been quietly turned over to the museum of the New Britain Institute, New Britain, Conn., for a "nominal sum."

The murals are considered to be the finest ever done by Mr. Benton, a leader in the American school of realism which was especially popular during the roaring 1920s and early '30s.

They were painted especially for the museum's library, but strained relations developed between the museum and the artist over the artist's fee and after several years the murals were found it necessary to exclude the general public from the library—except by special permission—because of a fire law technically.

They languished there in obscurity for 22 years until they were taken down and carted to New Britain several weeks ago. The news that this work had been disposed of outside the city without general knowledge in museum circles was revealed after the New Britain institution announced its acquisition of the murals. It plans to exhibit them permanently and to hold from May 22 to Sept. 19 a comprehensive loan exhibition of more than 30 other of Mr. Benton's most important canvasses.

Mr. Benton became a controversial figure in the middle 1930s when the left-wing groups denounced his "regionalism" as lacking in constructive social content.

A robust middle Westerner, bred in the Ozarks tradition, Mr. Benton quit New York in disgust

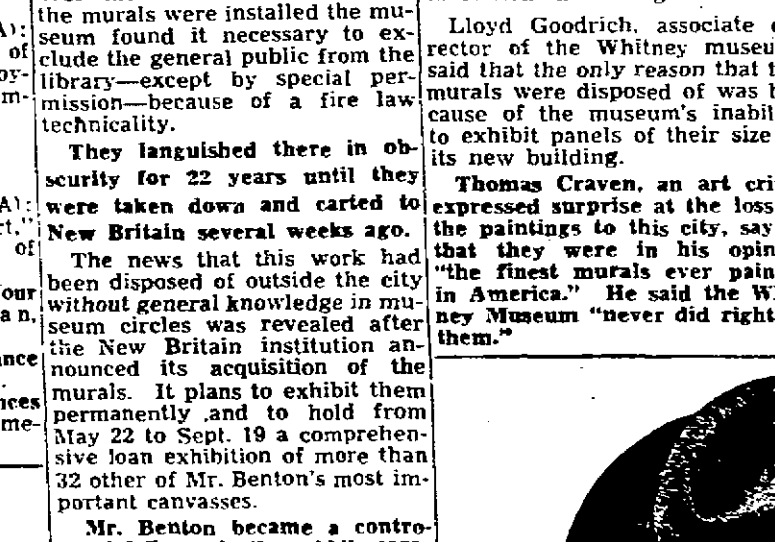

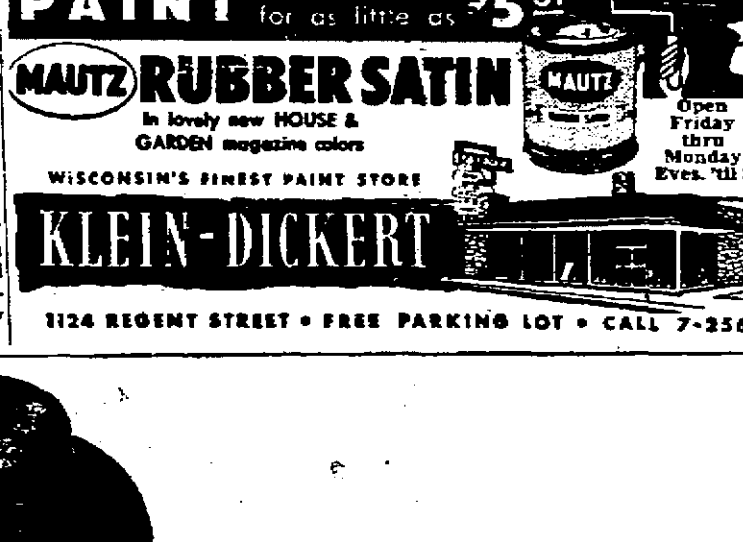
