The Hayes Replacement Depot

By PETER LIND HAYES I have spent a lot of time replacing Arthur Godfrey lately, so when I was approached, via the telephone, to replace Crosby, I assumed they

were talking about Bing Crosby. The voice on the other end said, "No." "Bob?" querried. "No," said the voice. "Surely not Everett," I screeched. "No," said the voice, "John Crosby." "Oh," I said, trying hard not to hide my isappointment. "He's the fellow that has been neglecting radio, isn't he? Well, I'll fix his

wagon. I'll write about radio." Four years ago, I made rather smug statement that adio would some day be confined to news and music. Today, after four sparkling years of nighttime television. I have finaly worked my way back to daytime radio.

As the replacement for Arthur Godfrey, I find myself in the enviable position of an enter-tainer being paid to stay off. Some of the letters I have received suggest that I am underpaid and that I

should hold out for more money.

I must admit the first few weeks of my new contract with CBS had a rather numbing effect on our happy household. Each Monday I would sneak up on the mailbox, grab the check, and run and hide in the basement.

My wife, Mary, finally tired of the constant wrangling between me and the dog as to who was going to eat first, so she called a CBS psychiatrist named Lester Gottlieb. Mr. Gottlieb is in charge of the ancient art form called radio, and when he heard that Arthur's latest replacements was about to crack up, he decided the best place to crack up would be on the CBS Radio Nutwork. He gave us a radio show.

One glorious afternoon we all had a Madison Ave. meeting. Al Singer became the producer, Frank Musiello the director, and Dave Vern the writer. Dr. Gottlieb decided the format should follow in the footsteps of the "Great Magoo," so we immediately set about building a family to be known as "Peter Lind Hayes and His Relatives." Relatively speaking, Arthur kind-ly consented to augment our little family with a member of his own as a guest star each week.
The billing now reads, Mary Healy, girl singer;
Jerry Vale, boy singer; Leslie Uggams, little girl

singer (aged 10); Norman Leyden and his all-boy orchestra with Teddy Wilson at the piano (Teddy Wilson, that's Liberace spelled forever). So here we are, back in radio.

Radio today, compared with radio in 1946,

is a starting transition indeed. In 1946 I did a show for 39 weeks for a motor company starring Dinah Shore and written by Abe Burrows. In that era, each word in the 30page script was labored over, edited, and polish-

ed until one's nerves finally crumbled at the mere thought of reading such deathless prose. Today, seven years later, the script for a halfhour radio show consists mainly of two tattered pieces of paper with hastily scribbled notes indi-cating which direction the plot should take. This, of course, makes the invaluable ingredient known as spontaneity.

Spontaneity, of course, can become a trap within a trap. If, perchance, two alert minds meet over an interesting subject, we can all sit back and enjoy the ensuing conversation. On the other hand, if two oafs come face to face with each other, the conversation might sound some-thing like this:

"How are you?"
"Fine, thanks, how are you?"
"Just fine thanks!"

'That's good, you're looking fine." "I'm feeling fine you're looking good!"
"Well, it's sure nice to have you here!"
(Pause ...) "Well, it's nice to be here!"

(Laughter.) The preceding conversation is the type I live in mortal fear of. On the eve of my first week of taking over for Arthur Godfrew, I practically shattered my long-suffering wife by leaping out of bed at 4 a. m. and shouting "No one will answer me! Frank, Marion, LuAnn, the McGuire sisters, Marvin Haleloke the Mariners. I've asked them all leading questions but all they say

is yes and no!" Mary gave me an aspirin, struck me on the head several times and I finally went back to

Arthur, of course, is unique in this respect. After 25 years of exposure, he can yawn on a coast-to-coast network and make it stick. I, on We are happy to be back in radio, though.
